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Church Established in Cuba

he island of Cuba (pronounced Coo-bah) was visited by Christopher Columbus on October 28, 1492, and he referred to the land as "the sweetest thing in the world." This sweetness soon turned to bitterness, as Spanish conquistadors quickly decimated the indigenous population of over 100,000 on the island, and slave labor was introduced. Cuba became a place of anguish for many as oppression became the norm. However, on February 12th, 2022, the sound of the Restored Gospel was declared to the land, and Cuba indeed became sweet, as the fruit most precious and sweet above all was partaken of freely for the first time.

On August 30, 2019, a young man named Maikel Batista was continuing a spiritual journey of discovery when he stumbled upon the Wikipedia page featuring The Church of Jesus Christ with headquarters in Monongahela,

PA, USA. The spirit spoke to him that he needed to investigate further, and that same day Maikel began corresponding with Evangelist Miguel Bicelis. Maikel had previously received a copy of the Book of Mormon from another faith but recognized that the gifting organization did not truly follow all the teachings of this new book, especially Alma 13's discussion of a holy priesthood being called after the Order of the Son of God. He had taken Moroni's charge to heart but knew that another organization must exist that matched the scripture that he had accepted to be the Word of God. Brother Miguel continued explaining our doctrine, and later recollected "Once Maikel realized he found the Church, everything changed. It changed his life. On paper, the Church had

the truth. But once he delved in, the Holy Spirit confirmed it to him." Maikel began passing along his newfound truth to others around him, including pastors in other Christian organizations. Soon, he began meeting and teaching the doctrine of Jesus Christ as The Church of Jesus Christ is blessed to understand. At the October 2021 General Church Conference's gathering of the Quorum of 70 Evangelists, Brother Miguel presented a case study of why Cuba should be the next country to receive the Restored Gospel. The brothers agreed, and approval was soon given by the Quorum of Twelve Apostles for the first missionary journey to the island of Cuba.

An investigation was conducted into the specifics of both the US Embargo and Cuba's internal visa requirements. God led and provided reassurance with each step of the way, and on February 11, 2022 Brothers Miguel Bicelis, Joel Gehly, Bryan Griffith, and Timothy Mott landed in Havana, (Continued on page 4)

Cuba. After greeting Maikel Batista the group began an eleven-hour journey eastward from Havana to the city of Las Tunas, Cuba. A vision was given of a closed door, wherein the Lord's angel knocked the door off its hinges, allowing the team to pass. A second vision was received back in the United States of a protective bubble around our vehicle. This was quite prophetic, as our 1957 Chevrolet narrowly missed a horse-drawn cart with three young men in the black of night in one of Cuba's various provinces. Arriving in the early hours of the morning, we praised God for his protection.

The first converts were baptized on the next day as we journeyed to the Puerto Padre water's edge. Our brothers took time to teach those assembled the meaning of a covenant, as well as the Church's belief in the Book of Mormon and our desire to see God's covenant with the House of Israel fulfilled. Our new Cuban friends sat with intent focus on the message and were soon given the opportunity to make their desire known. We had expected perhaps 10-12 souls to come forward, but almost every adult present was desirous to be part of the Restored Gospel, and twenty souls were baptized. The youngest was a teenager, while Brother Secundino Leyva-Vargas is believed to be the oldest convert in Church history, at 102 years old.

Sunday was a joyous day for our fledgling congregation, as they were able to witness

the blessing of children and partake in the Lord's Supper for the first time. Apostle Joel Gehly was inspired to preach from Revelation 3 and teach the Cuban people that God has accepted This Church He did the Church of Philadelphia. Brother Joel soon declared to the people, that The Church of Jesus Christ has been established in Cuba! As we opened the meeting for testimony, Sister Teresa responded with gladness to hear the proclamation and explained that Cubans are a simple people from a land made up of four letters (C-u-b-a). She praised God that He brought them four missionaries (one for each letter) to teach a simple message to a simple people.

As we started our weekday activities, each day was to be filled with ministerial training in the morning and early afternoon, with an evening service for the entire congregation. We were extremely blessed that Brother Maikel located a home-based hostel for the missionary team to stay, which was only a ten-minute walk to the Church meeting location. Brother Miguel Bicelis conducted the training with the other brothers providing assistance. We opened the training to other ordained officers who were interested to learn the intricacies of the Gospel. The Lord opened the minds of the Cuban saints, and they quickly absorbed the Restored Gospel.

The Spirit of God soon confirmed that two of our new brothers were being called into the ministry, Brothers Maikel and Juan. The Las Tunas Mission is composed of their two congregations that operate on separate sides of the city. They meet together as often as resources allow, as transportation can be problematic and cost-prohibitive at times. In addition to our two new ministers, the Lord called two teachers, three deaconesses, and one deacon.

We traveled a second time to the Caribbean Sea on the second Saturday of the trip, as eight converts had made their wishes known to join the fold. Altogether, twenty-eight (28) souls rendered obedience to the Lord Jesus Christ over the course of our visit. The Saints are engaged and thrilled to be a part of The Church of Jesus Christ. They are already giving their testimonies to others in the town, as well as throughout the island. The Gifts of the Spirit have begun working with the group as well, exemplified by our humble deacon, Brother Luis, as he received a beautiful vision of the authority of the ministry being conferred at the moment our first two ministers in Cuba were ordained.

The work of The Church of Jesus Christ in Cuba is simple and complex. The embrace given to the Restored Gospel by our new Saints with their simple, pure understanding is a beautiful thing to witness. We faced stiff opposition from the enemy in various forms as the trip progressed, and challenges remain. Various barriers still stand before us; however, God has reminded time and again that He is in charge of this work. One of our brothers had a vision when the missionaries were ending the day in prayer one evening. He saw a map of Cuba, and angels descending in great numbers to the shores. "The angels stood on all beaches facing the interior of the island. In a moment, they raised trumpets and blew a great sound of victory unto heaven. It was heralding the presence of The Church established in the entire nation." We marveled at how quickly the work unfolded before our eyes, as the Lord seemingly had already taken charge well in advance of our first steps on the island. However, the Lord lovingly told us through His Word coming forth back in the United States - "Thus saith the Lord! Have I not said that a nation would be born in a day? Marvel not now at these things, but prepare yourselves for the things you will see. Thus saith the Lord!" We humbly look to the future now, understanding that God has a precious nation

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Nursing Mothers

worked with a man years ago who had majored in Classics and studied Greek and Latin. To my delight (this was before the Internet), he could tell me the meaning of Latin phrases. One that I had wondered about was "alma mater." I learned that it means "nourishing mother," literally, "nursing mother." I had only heard it used in connection with colleges and universities, but I grasped the metaphor—a term of endearment, paying tribute to the institution that helped build and enrich a person's life. I never gave it much thought, but in hindsight, while I don't question the value of education, seeing one's school as a nursing mother might be overstating things a bit.

When you consider the stage of life when children actually have to be nursed, a number of descriptive terms come to mind:

- Helpless
- Dependent
- Defenseless
- Innocent
- Unlearned
- Demanding
- Immature

The words above will elicit a range of emotions. If you've ever nursed and cared for very young children you will have likely experienced the gamut of feelings from wonder and delight, to care and compassion, to annoyance and exasperation. The truth is, babies exhibit all of the traits listed here. What makes nursing mothers and fathers willing to take in stride the not-so-pleasant aspects of rearing a child and attending to their needs "24/7"? The answer, of course, is love.

The bond of natural affection that develops between parents—mothers especially—and their children gives us an amazing ability to exercise unconditional love and tireless care toward our young ones. A parent will dive in where an outsider might hesitate when it comes to something like cleaning up a soiled baby. In the fullest sense of the word, "nursing" requires a measure of humility as it involves a kind and delicate touch when dealing with private and often unpleasant aspects of personal care.

We also encounter the term "nursing mother" in the scriptures. It's a key phrase when it comes to prophecies and the future expectations of The Church of Jesus Christ. Isaiah (49:23, also quoted in 1 and 2 Nephi) likens the gentile nations to nursing mothers and fathers when describing the care and concern exercised toward the House of Israel. It says, "And kings shall be thy nursing fathers, and their queens thy nursing mothers: they shall bow down to thee with their face toward the earth, and lick up the dust of thy feet; and thou shalt know that I am the Lord: for they shall not be ashamed that wait for me."

Like the term "alma mater," I hadn't really thought much about the weight of meaning that verse carries. Because of their natural affection, parents will go to any length to care for their children. Likewise, God's love in us will enable us to do things we would otherwise balk at. Lick up the dust of someone's feet? In one interpretation, perhaps this verse can be understood to say that like nursing parents, even the highest echelons among the gentiles will shamelessly humble themselves and demonstrate Christ's love to such a degree that Israel cannot deny Him as their Messiah.

This love goes way beyond any natural affection. How is it otherwise possible? Moroni 7:48 tells us: "Wherefore, my beloved brethren, pray unto the Father with all the energy of heart, that ye may be filled with this love, which he hath bestowed upon all who are true followers of his Son, Jesus Christ; that ye may become the sons of God; that when he shall appear we shall be like him, for we shall see him as he is; that we may have this hope; that we may be purified even as he is pure. Amen." With that kind of love, we can truly be the nursing fathers and mothers the Lord has called us to be.


In their excitement for the Restored Gospel, the Cuban leadership team met several times to document all warm list locations where the Saints have family, friends, and other contacts interested to hear this beautiful Gospel. As Brother Maikel was involved in pastoral training throughout the island, several of these contacts are church leaders with their own congregations. The brothers presented the missionary team with a map of Cuba, pinpointing twenty-two (22) locations to target for expansion. The first such location is located in the Santiago de Cuba province on the east of the island, where Brother Jose and Sister Odalia reside. After receiving an invitation to come listen to the missionaries, they decided they would make the five-hour journey to Tunas to silently observe and report back to their congregations. During the first trip to the waters of baptism, the missionaries began singing a song written by the Saints in Mexico that speaks of the pureness of the doctrine of Jesus Christ as found in His Church, and that the world does not have this divine guidance. As the brothers sang, a sweet angelic voice was heard as if coming from on high, but it was actually Odalia being fed by the Spirit, singing the song word for word, even though she had never before heard it. The Spirit of God that Brother Jose and Sister Odalia felt through the message of the song and the ensuing preaching convicted them, and they were baptized into The Church of Jesus Christ. Plans are now underway to return to Cuba with a specific charge to

visit Santiago de Cuba, to help Brother Jose teach the Restored Gospel to the two small congregations he has raised up there.

When a sister had a vision of Cuba's baptisms taking place in aquamarine waters one week prior to the trip, the missionary team thought it strange. Las Tunas is a land-locked city, and with poor transportation infrastructure, it sits approximately two hours away from the Caribbean in either direction. Of course, we would rely on a nearby river or reservoir to perform baptisms, which a map showed to be plentiful. Upon arrival, the travel team was told that Cuba's dry season meant the rivers were all dry, and access to nearby reservoirs was prohibited due to their usage for drinking water. On Saturday, February 12, 2022, after a bumpy two-hour journey north to Bahia de Puerto Padre, twenty souls were reborn in the aguamarine waters of the Caribbean Sea, fulfilling the sister's vision.

"Finer than Frog's Hair" in North Dakota!

i there!
I'm Sister
Connie,
originally from
a small town
in western
Pennsylvania.
The Lord
brought me
about nine
and a half
years ago to
remote North
Dakota (ND)
(where there

are only about 10 people per square mile) to live on the Fort Berthold Indian Reservation, home of the Mandan, Hidatsa, and Arikara (MHA) people. My prayer was that, if the Lord provided a job, then I would follow Him there. As you can see, that happened.

I would not have been able to move approximately 1,500 miles across the country to such an unfamiliar wilderness if I had not relied completely upon God. Relying on God is not a new thing for me. Having "goodly parents like Nephi of old," I was raised in the Vanderbilt Branch in a humble way from an earthly standpoint, but in a very "richbeyond-measure" way, spiritually. My parents, Brother Lawrence (a faithful minister of God) and Sister Susanna King (deaconess and dedicated servant, having gone on to her reward) raised me to be kind to others and to look to the Lord for all of my wants and needs.

As I was growing up, we did not have much in the way of material things, but we had the Gospel and the joy of the Lord! Both my dad and my mom have used the phrase, "finer than frog's hair." Have you ever heard that expression? It is something that I grew up hearing my mom say many, many times. When someone asks you how you are doing, and you answer, "finer than frog's hair," what you are really saying is (since frogs don't have hair, but instead have fine microscopic cilia) ... "I am really, really fine!"

Believe it or not, at the time of this writing, my dad reported that he had just stated, "we are finer than frog's hair in Pennsylvania," to the car salesman he had been negotiating with! My dad then went on to explain to the man what the expression meant

My mom also taught us to bring a lot of laughter to situations. She had a knack for joking and making everyone feel included, even amidst her own physical ailments and challenges. I don't think that my mom particularly liked frogs, however, she did fully rely on God (F.R.O.G.) pretty much every day. Yep! FULLY rely on God! Like the scripture in Proverbs 3:5 says, "Trust in the LORD with all thine heart; and lean not unto thine own understanding" or like my favorite, "I can do all things through Christ, which strengtheneth me!" (Philippians 4-13)

Now, as a welcomed part of the MHA Nation, I completely subscribe to the F.R.O.G. and "finer than frog's hair" approaches!! The open lands of North Dakota, as you may know, have some extreme temperatures which may cause you to wonder... "do frogs live there?" Believe it or not,

frogs do live in North Dakota...where the winters are cold and the people are warm! However, while the ND frogs typically bury themselves deep into the ground to avoid the winter's harsh winds and freezing weather conditions, hibernation is not an option for me.

Anticipation of Fulfilled Prophecy

oday, we live in anticipation of the fulfillment of numerous latter-day prophecies that have been foretold in the scriptures. Although the reasons may vary for looking forward to a prophecy being fulfilled, we as followers of Christ anticipate the excitement of being with the Lord and those who love Him. Here are 5 amazing facts regarding different reasons that people in the scriptures had for anticipating the fulfillment of a great prophecy—the coming to earth of Jesus Christ.

Students of Prophecy - People who study the scriptures and prophecies have a level of understanding regarding what will happen in the future. They look forward to the fulfillment of prophecy to validate that they have properly understood those prophecies. An example of this would be the wise men who traveled a long distance to Bethlehem (see Matthew 2:1-7) to see the Christ child, based on their understanding of where and when He would be born.

Directly Involved - People greatly anticipate the fulfillment of prophecies for which they are directly involved and/ or used by God to bring them about. Mary and Joseph were used by God to bring forth the Son of God. Mary was the virgin foretold to bring forth the child and Joseph was the link to Bethlehem where it was foretold that Christ would be born.

Extension of Life on Earth - As foretold in Isaiah 65:20-22, we anticipate that life on earth will be extended for those who are alive at the time of Zion. In 3 Nephi 1, the Nephites had been sentenced to death and the only way their lives could be saved was for the sign to be given that Christ had been born. Just in the nick of time, Nephi was told that the prophecy would be fulfilled—the sign of Christ's birth was given and the lives of the Nephite believers were extended.

hen a patient is admitted to the hospital with any communicable disease, they are assigned an isolation room. They are separated from other patients, and any caregiver is required to wear personal protective equipment (PPE) to keep from spreading the disease. y husband, Michael, tells a lot of humorous stories from his childhood, and one of my favorites involves his middle school art teacher.

There was an unfortunate classroom incident concerning a mound of clay that resulted in the frazzled teacher literally shaking preteen Michael till his teeth rattled.

When Michael reported the episode at home, Mama Bear was not happy. She went full-on lioness.

Michael's mom decided to confront this art teacher the next day in the busy after-school parking lot. (Every soul in the school was in that parking lot.) She cornered him, aired her concern, and they actually had a very civil discussion about his treatment of Michael. It ended on good terms.

It being a Christian school, the teacher said, "Let's pray together."

All three of them joined hands and prayed.

Michael said that, even at a Christian school, praying with two adults in a parking lot was...shall we say, not helpful for a 12-year-old kid trying to fit in with his peers.

Even though he was raised right, Michael didn't want to be seen praying out loud in public with two adults — holding hands no less.

For the record, now that Michael is an adult, he'll pray in any parking lot, anytime, anywhere. He doesn't care who sees.

Thankfully, he grew out of that phase.

But sometimes we make it to adulthood and never really arc out of that immature mindset — the mindset that we want to look, act, and seem just like everyone



else even though God has called us to be different.

I repeatedly fall into this trap.

Even though I'm Christian, I feel the need to resemble those who aren't.

Why Do I Strive for 'Normal'?

I want to be seen as a "normal" person who also happens to be Christian. Like people are surprised when they find out. "Oh really? You are? Wow, you seem so normal!"

It's very important to portray cultural relevance, I tell myself. So, I binge that popular TV show, play that killing game ova-n-ova, and memorize the lyrics to the raunchiest songs in the Top 40.

I don't want people to think that following Christ means that you can't be normal. Tsk, tsk. Nobody's going to accept my invitation to church if I can't speak pop culture. I won't seem normal.

(I may do this out of false piety. "I'm not too holy to have a few drinks." "I don't want to appear self-righteous, so I'll laugh at that inappropriate joke.")

But, what's so wrong with being perceived as a Christian first and foremost?

A Peculiar Kinda Folk

1 Peter 2:9 says that Christians are a peculiar

people. For the longest time, I thought this meant "odd," but "peculiar" has several definitions. The one that KJV translators had in mind when they selected the word is actually "belonging exclusively to." As in, "the scent peculiar to dogs" or "the quirks peculiar to 12-year-old boys."

Michael found himself in that parking lot prayer circle because he was a special treasure belonging to his mother. Am I willing to pray in a parking lot because I'm God's treasure? Or am I too normal for that?

I'm called to "show forth the praises of him who hath called [me] out of darkness into His marvelous light." A light that a weary world unknowingly craves.

When I lose my grip on normal, I gain the privilege of shining the light of Jesus Christ.
