have always wanted to go to the continent of Africa. Lions, elephants, floodplains, deserts, jungles, gorillas....I thought all of those things were just waiting outside the jetway on the other side of a flight. A whole new world filled with everything covered in National Geographic documentaries, and I was slated to see it all. That was the hope I had when I heard "Brother, you're going to Africa."

It was the moment that Brother Phil Arcuri and I stepped off the plane that I realized I wouldn't be greeted by lions or elephants, but rather by a blanket of humidity and plenty of bugs. A sign that read "Welcome to Liberia" hung over the exit of the airport that I can only describe as organized chaos as I wrestled our luggage through the door. Brother Phil and I were there to visit the saints after a roughly nine-year absence of in-person interactions with anyone from the parent Church. We were greeted by brothers Anthony Gebah, Jackson Warlo (Presiding Elder), and Samuel Wialison.

We had arrived on a Friday evening, met with the ministry the next day, and were ready for church on Sunday. I want to focus on what we found that Sunday morning and in the days that followed.

Jesus states in Matthew 5:14, "Ye are the light of the world. A city that is set on a hill cannot be hid." On Sunday morning we found that light, that city on a hill, in a small village just outside of Monrovia. Let me tell you, it was so beautiful, like a basket full of jewels and gems. I didn't find lions or a scene from National Geographic; I found The Church of Jesus Christ, the power of the restoration, and above all, God's beautiful people. Jesus also said in 3 Nephi 24:17, "And they shall be mine, saith the Lord of Hosts, in that day when I make up my jewels; and I will spare them as a man spareth his own son that serveth him." Surely, these are His jewels, and we thank God for not only sparing their souls but for sparing them through the pandemic, along with the other difficulties they face in their country. I found myself humming the tune "When He Cometh," #378 in the Saints Hymnal, quite often.

Over the course of the next few hours, we sat in the church building beneath the throne of God, worshiping Him in Spirit and in Truth. The saints sang the song "Down on My Knees" while Brother Phil and I felt right at home in the Spirit. Who knew you could fly all the way to Africa and find "home"? We heard the Restored Gospel that day, and the testimonies of God's power among His people!

types of foods (following Hebrew law.) God explained the offering had already been blessed and Peter was permitted to partake: "What God hath cleansed, thou shalt not call common."

God used this double entendre to teach Peter tolerance, as the many coming into the church, who might normally have been overlooked societally, had been hand-picked. God was informing Peter that each one was divinely blessed, and was granting Peter permission to partake without prejudice, "Peter, there is no class system in My church!"

Today, every outreach of the Church must be endorsed by embodying Jesus' message that those He chooses have already heard His empowering phrase, "Ye are the salt of the earth." As God invites diverse individuals into His church to share pews with long-standing members, all must open hearts and minds. As Peter had to change his outlook, all must partake and understand that God does the cleansing; He washes off everyone's "common" equally. No true and genuine follower should ever be viewed as or considered common again. We are not asked to tolerate one another; we are commanded to accept, embrace, and love

one another.

We all left our "common" in the waters of baptism. God's message to His people is to see one another through His vantage point: His people are made uncommon by the blood of Jesus Christ. As we instruct the converts to walk from their sin in the newness of Jesus Christ, we must support our new brothers and sisters, and grant them the opportunity to grow beyond who they were. We become the generous facilitators to help them receive the same benefits each of us enjoyed. They are no longer who they were, but are instead "new creatures."

Lastly, to anyone new to their walk with the Lord, please understand you are no longer average, normal, or common! You are now given to the greatness of Jesus Christ. You have been cleansed and covered by His Holy Spirit. You need never consider yourselves common again, with no need (or desire) to return to your past. Know that God has chosen you to accomplish greater things now.

How can I be so sure of this? Because God told us: "What God hath cleansed, thou shalt not call common." Welcome to your new status: Uncommonly blessed!

The Church of Jesus Christ's embryonic years were defined by tremendous growth, which understandably generated remarkable growing pains. Such progress brought challenges, as new converts created a newly defined community of individuals that may never have been united in any other setting. As leader of The Church, Peter was not immune to this foreign blending of cultures, beliefs, and ethnicities, and may even have felt compromised in many strange ways. During the next few days, Brother Phil and I spent hours with the ordained officers and anyone else that could come, talking about what makes our Church different from any others, the Restored Gospel. Right away, we had her sit in the chair and we anointed her. She thanked us and went her way. All glory to God, she was one of the first people in Church on the following Sunday with a smile on her face. A jewel in the making.

The second Sunday, our last day there, we were even more blessed than we had been during the week. The previous day, we had three baptisms, so we got to celebrate the Lord's work on Sunday. We also had the blessing of ordaining a deaconess, a teacher, and two new ministers (Brothers Anthony and Samuel) to the work.

Little did I know, a local village councilman was present in our meeting. During the testimony portion of the service, he stood up and walked to the front of the room. He turned to the congregation and stated "This Church is welcome here in our village and should be respected as something important." He then went on to talk about how blessed he felt in the Spirit of God. It's wonderful when we find the city on the hill, but how incredible to have those outside the Church find it also! We were very blessed to be with our saints in Liberia, truly a beautiful sight that only the Lord could prepare.

Needless to say, I fell in love with Africa and I found the true beauty the Lord had waiting for us. I hope you know that you are His jewels, too. He looks at all of us every day, smiling as He sees the light of His Son shining in us. You are so loved! One day this light and love will cover the whole Earth, when every knee will bow and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord.

Capacity to Believe

The Lord reveals Himself to those who seek Him—in fact, the restoration story would never have happened without God's continuing revelation. Because God is the same, we use the Bible and Book of Mormon to validate any experiences submitted to the Church today, and while they need to align with the scriptures to be accepted as revelation, they don't merely restate what already has been written. Rather, the Lord's revelations to the Church lend clarity and focus to what He has previously revealed to His people, both in former and latter days.

In a recently accepted revelation to the Church, we were encouraged as we seek to deliver the Gospel to Joseph's descendants. In the experience, Joseph stated, "Hold to those concepts that He [the Lord] has directed you with in approaching my family. For remember, they are a people whom God has created with a special blessing and a capacity to believe."

Assigning a common trait collectively to any one group of people, be it a nationality, a race, socioeconomic background, or even region within a country, can fuel unfounded prejudices. Many of society's evils—past and present—have stemmed from negative biases toward people based solely on their group, with no regard to their individual qualities. Yet God reminds us in this experience that collectively, the House of Joseph has been given a special blessing and a capacity to believe.

Israel's (Jacob's) blessing upon Joseph can be found in Genesis 49:22-26. But we are given to understand that the Lord also bestowed believing hearts upon all the House of Joseph. Moroni 10:11 amplifies Corinthians 12:9 in listing exceedingly great faith, which could be rephrased as a capacity to believe, as a gift of the Spirit.

Capacity is defined in the natural world as the ability to hold a certain amount. It usually has limits associated with it (e.g., "maximum capacity). But in realms such as thought, emotion, and spirit—and even in our natural bodies' strength and mobility—capacity can be elastic; it can expand or shrink based on use. While capacity to believe can be a spiritual gift, it is important for all of us to exercise the measure of faith that we have been given. Laman and Lemuel were of the same lineage as Lehi and Nephi, yet they hardened their hearts while their brother and father believed. The Book of Mormon states that unbelief will cause miracles to cease and angels not to appear and minister unto the children of men (Moroni 7:37). Unbelief will do away with the power and gifts of God among us (Moroni 10:24).

Just as exercise can increase our bodies' capacity to do physical work, our souls' capacity to believe can also expand through exertion of a different kind. Study, prayer, meditation—and yes, adverse situations—can bring us to depend more fully upon the Lord. We don't usually categorize trials as being a blessing, but the scriptures (and many testimonies) give plenty of examples where this was the case. As Joseph stated to his brothers, "[...Y]e thought evil against me; but God meant it unto good, to bring to pass, as it is this day, to save much people alive" (Genesis 50:20).

Let us "be believing" (Mormon 9:27), and take part in God's wonderful plan to restore Joseph, all Israel, and eventually every nation, kindred, tongue, and people to the saving knowledge of Jesus Christ.



What do you think of when you read the following?

- Love
- Joy
- Peace
- Longsuffering
- Gentleness
- Goodness
- Faith
- Meekness
- Temperance

Galatians 5 refers to these qualities as the fruits of the Spirit. In examining them closely, I realize how many of these characteristics I lack in my own character. One fruit or attribute that I can personally relate to is longsuffering. At the very least, I can relate to the patience aspect of longsuffering. There have been times when patience was essential because God didn't answer my prayers quickly. Waiting on the Lord is always best, but it is not always easy. conceive a baby boy named Samuel and dedicated him to the Lord.

Hannah truly displays longsuffering. She faithfully prayed year after year. She did not give up. My favorite part of the story is that in total she bore five children, three sons and two daughters. This did not happen quickly; Hannah had patience. She also had patience when her adversary mocked her.

The power of negative words is so strong that scripture says Hannah did not eat. Think about the words that are often said to a childless couple. Sometimes a question as simple as "What are you waiting for?" or "When are you going to start a family?" can feel very adversarial because the person asking doesn't know the circumstances.

Hannah found comfort in pouring out her soul in prayer. What an example she portrays of longsuffering, and what I should do when I don't know what to do — pray! Merriam-Webster defines longsuffering as "suffering for a long time without complaining: very patient during difficult times." As I reflect on the times when I waited for answers, I can't honestly say I didn't complain. Did Hannah complain? No, she remained very patient during difficult times, and the Lord rewarded her faith with her desire and more.

So, if you are experiencing something today that requires patience and waiting, find strength from this amazing woman. To me, she epitomizes longsuffering, and she gives us a great example to follow during rough times in remaining faithful and seeking the Lord's will for our lives without complaint, but with acceptance and longsuffering.

Saturday, April 1, 2023, brought us together for a brief PMA Area Ladies' Circle business meeting. Sister Joyce Jumper led the members of the Area in a discussion, some pending business items, and the donation of funds to appropriate works of the Church. Outside, the spring showers turned to heavy rain, extreme storms, and the hotel even lost electricity for several hours, but nothing stopped the showers of blessings as we entered into the world of natural and spiritual husbandry with "How Are You Planted?"

The Aliquippa Ladies' Uplift Circle began with Sister Donna Bogle demonstrating how we must clear the soil of debris that would hinder the seed from taking root. We must do the same thing spiritually. Identify the things in our lives that separate us from God, ask for forgiveness, and then the seed (the word of God) is planted in good ground and can take root. It is watered and nourished by prayer, fasting, testimony and scripture reading. The natural seed will grow into a beautiful plant and the spiritual seed creates a beautiful saint. Alma 32:28 speaks of this very thing:

...It must needs be that this is a good seed, or that the word is good, for it beginneth to enlarge my soul; yea, it beginneth to enlighten my understanding, yea, it beginneth to be delicious to me.

Sisters Connie King-Gottschall, Sylvia King, and Cindy Bright presented a beautiful seminar continuing with the theme of the weekend and introducing "Three Sisters, Companion Planting." This gardening technique of the North American indigenous people plants corn, pole beans, and squash together as a trio because they support and strengthen each other as they grow. The cornstalk gives support to the growing bean. The bean has a dual purpose: The roots pull nitrogen from the air and bring it into the soil to benefit all three plants, and as the bean grows through the squash vines and winds up the cornstalk, it holds the three close

together. The large leaves of the squash provide shade for the soil, keeping it cool and moist and preventing weeds. The plant's prickly leaves keep pest away from the plant as it grows.

The Three Sisters sound very much like the Circle sisters. They are friends and want to be around each other and grow together. Through prayer, they protect and defend one another when needed. We each have been a corn, a bean, or a squash plant at one time or another. The Circle is a special garden, planted and maintained by our Lord.


At the conclusion of our seminar, the Young Ladies returned from their classes, shared some highlights of their lessons, and joined together as a group to sing "Lean on Me."

Brother Jim reminded us that we need to be seen as the people of God. He admonished us to serve one another in love.
