Knowing what we do, how can we not fully engage God's great work?


Some have asked: "When will God's plan begin to unfold?" In truth, this plan has been under way since Adam and has passed through several eras. Today we are standing on the inside threshold of the era when the prophecies concerning Joseph will intersect with the restoration of Jesus's Gospel in the hands of believing Gentiles—His Church—linking indivisibly to fulfill God's plan to restore the House of Israel and to expose all nations to Christ. As amazing as our individual salvations are, we ought to be equally impressed to know that God wants each of us to play our parts as His plan rolls on.

Scriptures testify of God's great work through the ages. Think about those who have been chosen by God to fulfill their given roles during every era of time. They have all been instruments in His plan. Many were given prophetic windows to the future which we are blessed to read today, being encouraged both by prophecies that have been fulfilled as well as by others which remain as promises. The gifts of the Spirit behind those blessings are still among us as part of the Restored Gospel of Jesus Christ. Through all of this, people have always had free will to choose obedience or not. We read of poor choices leading to detours, temporary domination by agents of the enemy of our souls, even disappearance of whole nations. But throughout scriptural history, we encounter faithful individuals who never doubted the Lord's omnipotence and commitment to fulfill His plan. We can be today's faithful ones. A review of scripture from the beginning is the best way to gain perspective on Joseph and where we stand today. Doing that completely would be a bigger task than can fit into this message, so let's briefly remember a few of those who God chose and the roles they played in His great work.

One hundred and thirty-eight years ago this month, born out of wedlock on March 4, 1885 in Casalordino, Italy, a poor orphaned boy named Antonio Molisani was born.

Antonio had a hard existence as a farmhand made worse by beatings from cruel foster parents that didn't allow him to eat at the table or sleep in the house, but in the stable with the animals. He didn't own a pair of shoes until he was 16 years old. A neighbor seeing his sad state gave him enough money to emigrate to America. So at sixteen years old, he made the 22-day trip, alone, in the bottom of the ship where livestock was slaughtered to feed those on the upper deck. The stench sickened him and he didn't see daylight until arrival. Scared and lonely with no parents or relatives, skills, friends or money, he boarded with an Italian family. Working a few meager jobs he saved enough money and moved to Detroit where the wages were better.

"Is it any wonder that I became an atheist? Many times I cursed the day I was born and kept telling myself that there was no God in heaven because, if there was a God, why was life so cruel to me from the time I was born?" Though he returned to Italy several times, World War I stopped him for fear of being drafted into the Italian army, so he did not return. At this time he became friends with the Frammolino family, who invited him to church. He didn't attend but sat in front of the house, mocking them to passersby and saying, "If you want to see a real sideshow, come in the house."

1976 and 1977 were the two most impactful back-to-back years of my life. In '76 I met my eternal life-partner. In '77 I met my natural life-partner. Both changed me. Both enhanced my life.

Why Joseph? A Message from the Quorum of Twelve Apostles

In Adam, God set up mankind's special status, giving him dominance with only a single obligation. While Adam's fall changed that status, it also triggered God's entire plan to have men consciously serve Him, winning their salvation instead of living a very limited existence of blissful ignorance. Adam fell that men might be... (see Genesis Chapters 1-4; 2 Nephi Chapter 2). Because of Adam's fall, Jesus Christ became mankind's hope to be restored to God's presence.

With Noah, it was established that man could find God's grace even while His disappointment in man's wickedness was so great that He repented of ever having created man on the earth. He chose Noah to build an ark whereby a remnant of the earth's species would be preserved to repopulate (see Genesis Chapters 5-9).

God promised Abraham that his posterity would be the source of blessing for all the families of the earth. This blessing, of course, refers to Jesus Christ who would be born as the son of Abraham's descendants. The development of Abraham and his posterity through his son, Isaac, and grandson, Jacob, is a story of God's Spirit in action. The promises were repeated both to Isaac and later to Jacob—who became known as Israel. In a dream, God promised Israel: "... I am the Lord God of Abraham thy father, and the God of Isaac: the land whereon thou liest, to thee will I give it, and to thy seed; And thy seed shall be as the dust of the earth, and thou shalt spread abroad to the west, and to the east, and to the north, and to the south: and in thee and in thy seed shall all the families of the earth be blessed. And, behold, I am with thee, and will keep thee in all places whither thou goest, and will bring thee again into this land; for I will not leave thee, until I have done that which I have spoken to thee of" (Genesis 28:13-15). Exactly the promises God made to Abraham (see Genesis Chapters 11-28).

Israel (Jacob) had twelve sons and one daughter. As this family grew, the House of Israel became significant. In Jacob's eyes, his eleventh son, Joseph, stood out and was loved more than the other children. Meanwhile, God revealed to Joseph that he really was a person chosen by God. He saw in dreams that his siblings and his parents would make obeisance to him. Even his father took pause at that revelation, but his brothers, who were already jealous, became intensely resentful and sold him into slavery. Nevertheless, Joseph, while in Egypt enduring slavery, temptation, imprisonment, and abandonment, remained a true man of faith endowed with God's gifts. Ultimately, the prophetic dreams of his youth were fulfilled. Some key points that are important in setting the prophetic template that matches latterday prophecies to be fulfilled (See Genesis Chapters 37-48):

- Joseph became separated from the rest of the House of Israel.
- Joseph suffered greatly having lost everything and being imprisoned in a far land.
- Through it all, Joseph remained faithful to God without compromise.
- God's spiritual gifts to Joseph led him to become second only to Pharaoh in Egypt.

- Meanwhile, Israel and family fell into desperation during famine, unknowingly appealing to Joseph (whom they believed had died) for natural salvation.
- It was Joseph who saved the House of Israel and became reunited with them.

The House of Israel remained in Egypt and thrived there. However, as generations passed and the memory of Joseph faded, they were no longer welcome friends but were forced into servitude under rigorous conditions, including the Pharoah's attempts at genocide. God chose Moses to lead Israel back to the land that He had promised to Abraham. God treated Moses like no other prophet in that he spoke to him directly and knew him face to face. God gave Moses the Ten Commandments and the Laws under which Israel was commanded to live. Under these laws and Moses's inspired leadership, Israel grew to become the great nation that God promised to Abraham. No external obstacles could hinder their progress. Their army numbered over 600,000 and marched in the strength of the Lord over all the peoples who stood in their way. However, internal murmuring and rebellion among the people provoked the Lord greatly, causing Him to lead them in a very circuitous route to the promised land. (See Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers, Deuteronomy.)

Let's pause our review for a moment. At this point (Moses), it has been roughly two and a half millennia since Adam fell, including almost 500 years since God spoke to Abraham, and it will be almost another one and a half millennia before Christ is born. As observers, we might say that God's plan is unfolding very slowly. Yet, upon looking closer at important details, we will agree that there are points where things move very fast—even instantly. For example:

- One day immortal Adam dwelt in Eden without a care in the world; the next he is out, destined to die, and left to provide for himself from ground which has been cursed.
- One day the earth was corrupt and filled with violence; a few months later only Noah's family remains along with the animals he has saved on the ark.
- One day Abraham's wife Sarah was a near-centenarian who had never borne a child, struggling to believe the promises God made to her husband; the next day she has conceived the son who will inherit those promises.
- One day Joseph was a forlorn prisoner with no earthly hope of release; the next day he is overseer of all the wealth of Egypt—second only to Pharaoh himself—positioned to save the House of Israel from perishing in famine.

We might conclude that key turning points in God's plan tend to occur suddenly and rapidly, not necessarily without prediction but nonetheless catching many by surprise. Keep this thought in mind.

During the next eight centuries, the House of Israel faced external enemies while continuing to waver between faith and faithlessness before the Lord. God chose men—prophets, judges, and even kings—to try to keep them faithful.

New Things By Brother Anthony Scolaro

W e see renewal all around us at this time of year as winter gives way to spring. Again and again we've watched the seasons change: Seeds sprout and trees put forth new leaves and branches as the weather warms and the days lengthen. The times and the seasons give us a glimpse of God's creative and restorative power. But the scriptures compel us to look beyond the mere temporal, and prompt us to seek a deeper understanding of His ability to bring about His plans for the world as well as our own lives. Strewn throughout the word of God are passages and verses that indicate that God's creative work is ongoing. Key to God's renewing Spirit and power is the ultimate goal of moving His fallen creation to a state of righteousness.

"And he that sat upon the throne said, Behold, I make all things new." These words come at the end of John's amazing vision (Revelation 21:5). The new heaven and earth in the beginning of this chapter mirror Genesis 1:1, where heaven and earth were first created. Six times in that chapter, God saw that it was good; very good, in fact (verse 31). Yet John saw an even better heaven and earth coming. The scriptures remind us that even after we (mankind) mess up the good things that He created, He is able to transform them into something better. "Nevertheless we, according to his promise, look for new heavens and a new earth, wherein dwelleth righteousness" (2 Peter 3:13).

"Behold, I will do a new thing; now it shall spring forth; shall ye not know it? I will even make a way in the wilderness, and rivers in the desert" (Isaiah 43:19). We tend to look at challenging circumstances using only our natural senses, and try to reason whether, or how, a solution could be devised. The word of God makes it clear that His creative and regenerative ability is not dependent on our natural surroundings. Testimonies of individual homes being spared in devastating storms, and gardens flourishing when the neighbors' crops failed, remind us to look with an eye of faith toward the things that God can and will do for His children.

"And he said unto me, Son of man, can these bones live? And I answered, O Lord GOD, thou knowest" (Ezekiel 37:3). What we see with our eyes can sometimes get in the way of believing in God's creative, restorative power and His ability to make something mighty out of what seems to be nothing. "There is a lad here, which hath five barley loaves, and two small fishes: but what are they among so many?" (John 6:9). We have to believe, when our senses tell us things are beyond hope, that God is able to bring a good outcome to an impossible situation.

"Create in me a clean heart, O God; and renew a right spirit within me" (Psalms 51:10). Relevant to each of us, and perhaps most important, is the fact that the Lord is able to renew our souls. He can lift us from despair and fill us with hope. He can turn our ragged, sinful garments into gleaming robes of righteousness. God's renewing power isn't a matter of just recycling old things; He is able to "give beauty for ashes, the oil of joy for mourning, the garment of praise for the spirit of heaviness" (Isaiah 61:3).

God is in the business of renewing, reviving, and restoring. If we're looking to the world to supply our needs, we're looking in the wrong place. Jesus can and will supply us with what we lack, and make us feel full when we're feeling empty. "Therefore if any man be in Christ, he is a new creature: old things are passed away; behold, all things are become new" (2 Corinthians 5:17).

The renewing of our mind, the making of a new creature in Christ, is the ultimate expression of God's renewing power. It's a miracle He can work in every soul that will let Him.

We Are More Than Conquerors By Sister Lydia Zaino

It was so great to gather for an Area MBA campout after 2 years. We had a wonderful turnout and two very special guests, Brother Joel and Sister Ruth Gehly. We thank them for their support and a chance to get to know them even more. The Spirit of God was there when we arrived.

There was an orientation meeting Friday night and Brother Ken Lombardo opened with Mark 6:30-31, "And the apostles gathered themselves together unto Jesus, and told him all things, both what they had done, and what they had taught. And he said unto them, Come ye yourselves apart into a desert place, and rest a while." He encouraged us to leave the world behind and come to camp. Brother Ken's message was followed by an interactive team trivia game on the Songs of Zion.

Saturday morning began with a fasting & prayer meeting followed by breakfast and chapel. Brother Eric Darr opened our chapel meeting, talking about our theme. He opened on Romans 8:37 "Nay in all things we are more than conquerors through him that loved us." Paul was trying to teach us that God is bigger than anything. Conqueror means winner—overcomer. The enemy of our soul constantly tries to win but we are the children of God and have been chosen, and are more than Conquerors with Christ. He continued with verses 38–39, "For I am persuaded, that neither death, nor life, nor angels, or principalities, nor powers, nor things present, nor things to come, Nor height, nor depth, nor any other creature, shall be able to separate us from the love of God, which is in Christ Jesus our Lord." We need to have God with us to overcome. He shared a testimony with us of how he called for his baptism and how God rescued him with the love of God. Brother Eric finished up by reading John 10: 27-30. He said that only God can help you overcome the adversary when things try to take us away out there, jobs, friends, drugs, alcohol, etc. To be more righteous and prepared is a daily struggle because we are human, but when you keep God in your forefront you cannot go wrong. God loves us and wants to use us.

Following chapel, we went into our seminars. Sisters Terri Bravo, Donna Rios, and Joan Longuillo planned a seminar for children up to 12 yrs. Brother Ken Lombardo took care of the adult seminar, and the scripture he used was in Revelations Chapter 2. He divided us into 7 groups to represent each of the 7 churches: Ephesus, Smyrna, Pergamos, Thyatira, Sardis, Philadelphia, and Laodicea. We had a few questions to answer, so we had to pick a Presiding Elder and Secretary of the group. We met with our groups and then met together and Brother Ken had each representative of each Church answer a series of questions. Example: What are you doing wrong and what are you doing right? Did Jesus give you any advice? We saw a pattern in these churches. For the one that overcomes, God made promises, The Church of Philadelphia is the one that we resemble the most.

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But the overall spiritual condition of Israel continued to decline. The kingdom of Israel divided into two kingdoms: Israel, comprised of 10 tribes, and Judah, comprised of Benjamin and Judah. Because of continuing disobedience, two huge events resulted in the House of Israel losing control of their promised land and suffering again under other oppressive nations:

- During the 8th Century BC, the Assyrians carried off the people of Israel northward to Assyria as slaves. Eventually, they were dispersed further. Those ten tribes became lost to humanity. Only God knows where they are today (see Il Kings Chapter 12). It is noteworthy that the same Assyrians could not prevail against Judah at that time as their good King Hezekiah did that which was right in the sight of the Lord. The angel of the Lord slew 185,000 men of the Assyrian army in one night, thereby ending the siege of Jerusalem (see Chapters 18 and 19).
- Judah remained intact, but after Hezekiah passed, his son became king and reigned for 55 years, leading his people back to rampant pagan religious practices as had been in place before Hezekiah. The people of Judah offended the Lord so greatly that He determined to let Judah fall into the hands of their enemies. Many prophets, including Jeremiah and Ezekiel, foresaw that God's wrath would render Jerusalem desolate, the people to be carried away. This transpired early in the 6th Century BC (see Chapters 20-25). (Eventually, a remnant of Judah was allowed to return to Jerusalem and rebuild, but the domination of other nations continued. By the time Jesus was born, the Romans ruled over Judah and the land of Israel.)

Meanwhile, Lehi, another prophet, was also given to warn Jerusalem of the pending destruction. Lehi was a descendant of Joseph. God led Lehi to take his family and escape the demise of his homeland, thus preserving a remnant of Joseph separate from the rest of the House of Israel. Lehi's youngest son (at the time), Nephi, believed all the revelations God gave to his father and began to receive his own experiences. God led their party to His choicest promised land—the Americas. We read of their journey, their establishment in the American continents, and the development of their people over the next 10 centuries in their record: The Book of Mormon.

From the destruction of Jerusalem forward, God's works are recorded in two records. In the Bible, we read of Jesus' birth, ministry, death, and resurrection. We read of the hope of salvation He brought. We read of the works of His followers. Eventually we read that the Gospel spread from Jerusalem to the Gentiles in surrounding lands. In the Book of Mormon, we read of the establishment of Christ's church among the Seed of Joseph in the Americas even before His birth. We read that His followers were made aware of His birth and His death. We read that Jesus visited the descendants of Joseph in the Americas after His death and presented His entire ministry and Gospelsetting up His Church among them as He had in Jerusalem. Both records tell of the apostasy wherein God's authority would be removed from the earth, and foretell the restoration that would occur in the latter days when the Gentiles would bring Joseph back to Christ.

As of today, the Restored Gospel is in the hands of believing

Gentiles: The Church of Jesus Christ. That restoration occurred on this land, where the remnant of Joseph remains—their traditions include apostate religions as well as vestiges of spiritual history reflecting the time when Jesus visited their ancestors telling them of their promises.

When Jesus visited the remnant of Joseph after His crucifixion, he told them of the latter days, the Gentiles' role, and their restoration. For example, see 3 Nephi 20:1-7: And ... I give unto you a sign, that ye may know the time when these things shall be about to take place-that I shall gather in, from their long dispersion, my people, O house of Israel, and shall establish again among them my Zion; ... when these things which I declare unto you, and ... which shall be given unto you of the Father, shall be made known unto the Gentiles that they may know concerning this people (Joseph, the native peoples of the Americas) who are a remnant of the house of Jacob, and concerning this my people who shall be scattered by them; Verily, verily, I say unto you, when these things shall be made known unto them of the Father, and shall come forth of the Father, from them unto you... that these things might come forth from them unto a remnant of your seed, that the covenant of the Father may be fulfilled which he hath covenanted with his people, O house of Israel; Therefore, when these works and the works which shall be wrought among you hereafter shall come forth from the Gentiles, unto your seed which shall dwindle in unbelief because of iniquity; For thus it behooveth the Father that it should come forth from the Gentiles, that he may show forth his power unto the Gentiles, for this cause that the Gentiles, if they will not harden their hearts, that they may repent and come unto me and be baptized in my name and know of the true points of my doctrine, that they may be numbered among my people, O house of Israel; And when these things come to pass that thy seed shall begin to know these things—it shall be a sign unto them, that they may know that the work of the Father hath already commenced unto the fulfilling of the covenant which he hath made unto the people who are of the house of Israel.

We can see that the Lord has never turned His eyes away from mankind, and that He has kept a remnant of Joseph to be used again in His great work. Throughout the ages, the great plan of salvation has been grinding forward. Can you grasp the "Great Work of the Lord?" Can you form a mental picture of progress through the centuries leading to our time? Can you see why Joseph is so prominent in the work of the Church today? As He did in eras past, the Lord continues to reveal His will to the Church to encourage us and to direct us so that we can fulfill our roles in His great work and share in the inheritance of His promises to Israel. We can trust that He will bless us as we endeavor to remain sanctified and to focus upon Jesus Christ and His plan for all.

"What's That You Say?" "The tree is known by his fruit." (Matthew 12:33)

It's not always just what you say, how you say, when you say, or even why you say. It might just be all of the above, because once you say, you can't erase what you say...or the way you say. As it's said, "It may be forgiven, but not necessarily forgotten." Once you say you follow Jesus Christ, you have to make certain your mouth supports your declaration, because your words matter. Many people subscribe to the phrase, "Presentation is everything," emphasizing a clear understanding to the importance of how words are communicated and the impact they carry. Often, they are the only means for you to represent yourself and/or the organization for which you stand.

Paul understood, "Let no corrupt communication proceed out of your mouth, but that which is good to the use of edifying, that it may minister grace unto the hearers" (Ephesians 4:29). Who are the "hearers" of your words? Your words are intended to be a salve to them. James recognized, "If any man among you seem to be religious, and bridleth not his tongue, but deceiveth his own heart, this man's religion is vain" (James 1:26). Your words must absolutely align with your commitment to and your love for Jesus Christ. More importantly, Jesus knew, "Not that which goeth into the mouth defileth a man" (Matthew 15:11). Your words are more harmful to you than your diet. He also said, "Either make the tree good, and his fruit good; or else make the tree corrupt, and his fruit corrupt: for the tree is known by his fruit (Matthew 12:33). Your words define you.

Posturing defensively, people often state, "I'm only speaking the

truth." To whose truth they are speaking? Furthermore, how, when, what, and why was this truth spoken? Note: the same question can be sourced in 2 completely separate intentions. "Why me, Lord; what did I ever do?" can be asked by the selfjustifying individual questioning why they deserved such poor treatment and why God would punish such a good person as themselves. "Why me, Lord; what did I ever do?" can also be the inquiry of a humble, unassuming person wondering what they ever did to deserve God's mercy, goodness and/or grace.

Your loving communication is one of your most important representations of Jesus Christ, regardless of who you are addressing, which includes spouses, family members, co-workers, friends, strangers, store clerks, etc. Each dialogue provides opportunity to reflect Christ-like kindness, gentleness, and care. Please consider:

1) What can you lessen or eliminate from your negative communication?

2) What can you increase or add to improve your communication?3) Who can you positively impact this week through more loving communication?

4) Specifically, how will you accomplish this?

You can effectively spread Jesus Christ through one-on-one interactions. When you become more cognizant of how you are being received, your heightened awareness improves your opportunities. This results in becoming more effective magnets to draw others to Jesus Christ, and ultimately their salvation. When they ask, "What's that you say?"

Ladies' Uplift Circle News

History of the Penn Mid-Atlantic Area Ladies' Uplift Circle



What a privilege to look back on the history of the PMA Area Ladies' Uplift Circle, which is relatively young in comparison to some of the Area Circles that have been active since the 1960s. By Sister Karen L. Progar, Historian

Even before we were an Area, our sisters have always been eager to participate in the work of the Circle, but on March 31, 1985, as our sisters were on their way home via bus from a General Circle Conference held at Detroit Branch #1, a discussion arose regarding Area Circles and it was suggested that we form an Area Circle. The common thought had been that the Pennsylvania sisters had the opportunity to attend and support all GC activities because of our proximity to most of them, and there was no real need for an Area Circle. The sisters debated and voted to organize an Area Circle.

On May 11, 1985, our organization meeting was held at the McKees Rocks Branch. Sister Mabel Bickerton reviewed the organization procedure and the role of the Chairman was to work with the Local Circles. Sister Elsie Gehly became the Chairperson (since 1988, President), Sister Diane Ciotti was elected Secretary, and Sister Eva Ondik was chosen as Treasurer. In the beginning, the local presidents were to act as advisors to the President.

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A full roster of officers was elected in March of 1994, with changes in the Ladies' Uplift Circle by-laws. The PMA Circle held its first Area conference on November 2, 1985. It is interesting to note that Sister Mabel Bickerton did our seminar that day with the topic, "Search the Scriptures", something that is a basic precept of the Circle. Our first retreat (currently, Fellowship Weekend) was on August 22 and 23, 1986 at McKeever Environmental Center, near Fredonia. The sisters wasted no time getting the Circle up to speed on activities. In the 37 years since its inception, the PMA Area Circle has held 28 weekend events for the sisters and over 70 conferences. Our Area was the first to use the facilities of Antiochian Village in Ligonier (July 1987), which later became an important venue for our Area MBA and several GMBA Campouts.

It is difficult to write a brief history of the Area because the sisters have been so active. Following are a few events and activities that have defined our Area:

May 5, 1990 - First Mother-Daughter Banquet (Monongahela)

March 20, 1993 - The first Joy Box was sent from the Area. A Joy Box is seven small gifts with a scripture verse to be opened every day for a week, given to someone who is sick or for encouragement.

March 21, 1998 – The Area voted to create a committee to make travel communion sets for Missionary work.

February 16, 1991 – The Area held a special activity to see the Plants of the Bible at Phipps Conservatory in Pittsburgh.

April 29, 2000 - Hosted the General Circle 80th Anniversary

meeting at the Monongahela Local.

June 11, 2003 – Visiting Sisters program began with a visit to the McKees Rocks Local for a lesson and fellowship.

September 2005 – The PMA Area took on the responsibility of updating the Songs of Zion at the World Operations Center.

April 28, 2007 – a committee was formed to develop activities for the girls in the PMA Area.

2014 – Gift Cards were sent to college students in a Program called SOS, Support our Students and Soldiers.

In addition to all of those activities, the Area has supported the missionary work of The Church, sponsored numerous Vacation Bible Schools, developed many Church leaders, and met every need presented to the group. In 2021, special donations of \$2,500 each were made to the IMOC and NAOC.

Presidents throughout the years have been: Elsie Gehly, Sara Vancik, Karen Progar, Jan Cornell, Linda Ottavian, Joyce Ross, Becky Tarbuk, Jacqui King, Connie Frankenbery, Robin Burns, Marty Jumper, Angela Yoder, and Joyceann Jumper

Our secretaries included; Diane Ciotti (Giannetti), Nancy Gehly, Dorothy Schaeffer, Marty Jumper, Mary Buffington (twice), Jan Cornell, Jacqui King, Sandy Bittinger, Sherri Wasik, JoAnn Niehl, Jessica Painter, and Karen Progar.

This rich history fills us with joy and represents outstanding accomplishments.
