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Happy Mother's Day!

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Heroic Mothers

When Helaman led his 2,000 young soldiers into battle (Alma chapters 53 & 56), they said to him that it was their mothers who told them if they believed, the Lord would save them. Alma 56:47 & 48 state, "[T]hey had been taught by their mothers, that if they did not doubt, God would deliver them. And they rehearsed [...] the words of their mothers, saying: We do not doubt our mothers knew it." It's a touching story that has no doubt played into many a Mothers' Day sermon.

Recently, I heard it suggested that the reason these young men attributed this teaching to their mothers was that their fathers had been among those killed in the confrontation recorded in Alma 24. Having buried their weapons in a covenant never to kill again, the converted Lamanites in this account went out unarmed to face their attacking enemies. I had never thought to connect the two narratives, separated as they are by some 30 chapters, but the timeframe cited makes it completely plausible for Helaman's young army to have consisted largely of fatherless sons.

His epistle in Alma 56 tells us that these young men marched into battle under Helaman's leadership in the 26th year of the reign of the judges. Assuming they ranged in age between 16 and 21 years at that time, they would have been born between the 5th and 10th years of the judges' reign, i.e., during the sons of Mosiah's mission to the Lamanites. Year numbers were not logged in the record of their odyssey (Alma chapters 17-25); however, the beginning verses of that passage indicate that the entire episode – during which the massacre of the 1,005 who had buried their weapons took place – concluded at the end of the 14th year.

Given the documented years, if Helaman's young warriors were 16-21 when they fought with him in the 26th year, any of them who might have lost their fathers in the Alma 24 conflict would have been between five and ten years old at that time, possibly even younger. That Helaman refers to them in Alma 56:10 as his "sons" lends further credence to the idea that a father figure might have been missing from their lives.

So, what is the point of all this? My real intent is to focus not on these stripling soldiers but on their mothers, as alluded to in chapter 56. While I had always taken this account to be a powerful witness of the crucial role a mother plays in shaping her children's faith, this closer look at their circumstances put them in a whole new light. I hadn't fully realized the degree of spiritual maturity and fortitude these women must have possessed.

As part of a group who were convicted by God's power to bury their weapons forever, they shared with their husbands in a decision of extreme obedience to face the attacking enemy unprotected. Left as a result to raise their children alone, these same women later watched as their young sons marched into battle with Helaman, equipped with the confidence their mothers had instilled in them that the Lord would spare them if they believed. 

Blast From The Past



Seventy years ago this month on May 21, 1953, a historic F-4 tornado spared the Maness family on the Sarnia Reservation in Ontario, Canada. Two years earlier, Sister Elvira Maness had a dream in which she saw herself standing at the river shore with many other native people. Suddenly a storm arose from the United States side of the St. Clair River that was about to besiege the Sarnia Reservation. As she stood there, a voice spoke to her saying, "Pray so that your people might be spared." Two years later, on May 21, 1953 a great tornado ravaged the cities of Port Huron, Michigan and Sarnia, Ontario. As Sister Maness was looking out her window towards the St. Clair River and Port Huron, she saw a tornado coming closer to her home and she remembered her dream. She quickly took her children into the living room and knelt in prayer, asking God to have mercy upon her home and people. She felt peace and knew while still on her knees that God had answered her prayers.

ong ago, when our firstborn (Courtney) was being a bit challenging, Candace took her frustrations to my mother for counsel. Mom offered comfort through patience, telling Candace, "Remember, it's just a stage. Children go through stages, but they're temporary. This soon will pass."

More than 30 years later, it still applies: "It's just a stage." There are said to be 5 stages in our relationships, which normally arrive in order:

- 1) The Romance Stage (aka Addiction Stage)
- 2) The Power Struggle Stage (aka Love Hangover Stage)
- 3) The Stability Stage
- 4) The Commitment Stage
- 5) The Co-Creation Stage (aka Bliss Stage)

Relationships can begin in strange pairings, as opposites truly do attract. These seemingly destined-to-fail undertakings succeed because our

brains release chemicals that create an addiction-like behavior that carries us forward into The Romance Stage.

As the effects wear off, we see clearer, and conflict manifests within The Power Struggle Stage. Most relationships end in break-up during these first two stages. Survival can occur, but nothing improves until we accept accountability and work towards improvements. Success results in The Stability Stage, and once secured, we are catapulted into the period most appropriate for marriage, The Commitment Stage. Here we are able to find genuine enjoyment by accepting each other and discovering solutions to our differences in The Co-Creation or Bliss Stage. We travel into these stages through cyclical, and not linear, movement, so we visit and revisit them throughout the relationship.

"Love one another" is God's directive, but love requires more work than most anticipate. The Word of God defines and refines love, as Paul points out, "Charity suffereth long, and is kind; charity envieth not; charity vaunteth not itself, is not puffed up" (1 Corinthians 13:4). A key component in any relationship is patience ("suffereth long"), as uncovered differences need to be addressed, but through our caring attention. This behavior is the offspring of

humility ("vaunteth not itself, is not puffed up").

And so it is with our spiritual love. It begins similarly, with an opposite attraction, as Jesus Christ epitomizes confliction to our natural spirits. Applying these same 5 stages to our spiritual relationship, we often make our commitment during the Romance Stage, getting baptized before most challenges are even manifested. When they do appear during The Power Struggle Stage, we can be drawn away, discouraged, and even "break up" with Christ. If we instead accept responsibility for our actions, submit to God's direction, work through the challenges, triumph over our weaknesses, and overcome our temptations, we successfully transition to The Stability Stage. By leveling off and discovering the beauty of balance, we are ready for full engagement found in The Commitment Stage. Having been tested and tried, we are resolute in our dedication to the Lord, and move joyfully into The Co-Creation Stage, with full realization of all Jesus Christ offers. It's in this stage where we can be best utilized for God's glory, side-by-side with our Savior.

As it is with any healthy relationship, the process spirals upward and no one phase is a permanent destination. Really, it's just like Mom said years ago: "It's just a stage!"

The faith of those widowed mothers and the heroism they shared with their husbands had led them to teach their sons to exercise that same great faith in God. Any hint of fear in these women's hearts, or regret about the earlier sacrifice of their husbands' lives, would have fostered unbelief and resentment in their sons' hearts, bringing about a tragic outcome rather than the victorious one Helaman writes about. These women overcame; they eschewed the bitterness that the enemy of righteousness no doubt tempted them with, and instead raised sons who valued their fathers' freedom and honored their memory.

More often than we would like, we see mothers today called upon for various reasons to perform double duty when it comes to raising their children. As if the demands of running a household and furnishing emotional support are not enough, single mothers are compelled also to provide the resources to supply their children's material needs, frequently carrying a load that sometimes seems insurmountable. Taking a fresh look at this account in the Book of Mormon gives us occasion to pay tribute to this very special breed of mothers who, through one circumstance or another, have been tasked to raise a family absent the elements that a husband and father would normally contribute.

Part of James's definition of pure religion is "to visit the fatherless and widows in their affliction" (James 1:27). Interestingly, he uses the singular form of "affliction" here – not referring to a variety or assortment of conditions; but rather, a common, shared malady. While those of us who have never been in that situation may not be able to fully relate to the fatherless and widows (and by extension, single mothers), perhaps James's words can prompt us to acknowledge their "affliction," exercise more compassion and understanding, and look for ways we can assist those who have little help, if any, in raising their children.

Without minimizing the difficulty, we are encouraged by many examples of how God provided what was lacking, even in these situations, to enable mothers to successfully raise children who love and trust in Him. One sister whose husband endured a period of debilitating illness shared, "God filled in where my abilities, courage, and strength ended." The situation those mothers in the Book of Alma found themselves in proves that He can and will take care of us, even when we make extreme sacrifices to keep our commitment to Him and follow His commandments.

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
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She looked out the window again and saw the tornado heading north. Later they sang hymns of praise for several hours at Brother Lovalvo's home. The tornado was recorded as being 1.5 miles wide at its peak, and on the ground for a lengthy 2 hours and 39 minutes, starting at 4:20 in the afternoon and dissipating around 7 pm. Large sections of both cities were damaged. It destroyed or damaged over 400 homes and killed 2 in the US before crossing the river into Canada, producing golf ball-sized hail. As it moved through Sarnia, over 100 businesses and 150 homes were damaged, killing 5, leaving 48 injured, and 500 homeless. "God in his heavens makes the whirlwind pass by, and He laid the foundations of the earth and the sky...He's the Master Creator, He's the Father of all." (#78 The Master Creator, The Songs of Zion).

God is Speaking. Are We Listening? Are We Doing?

An old hymnal had a song titled "I'll be somewhere listening." Are we? Another old hymn says "Speak, my Lord, and I'll be quick to answer thee." Are we quick? And, more importantly, are we doing?

First, let's note the difference between hearing and listening. Hearing is the physical act of receiving words from another person. Whereas listening includes the reception of, and reaction to, information. The Apostle James spoke on this subject but with a certain twist. He indicated that being a hearer of the Word is like a person who looks at themselves in the mirror, and the moment they walk away they forget what they look like. So he instructed us to look into the "perfect law of liberty" and act upon it, that would make us a true doer of the word of God (James 1:22-25). (Also see Lehi's comment to his son Jacob in 2 Nephi 2.)

There was a motivational speaker who had an activity for his audience where he asked them to guess the design of the face of their watches without looking. Many were surprised to find that they didn't know, or were wrong. But that wasn't the end of the activity. He then asked them what time it was, without looking at their watches. Only a few knew. They were so focused on the task that they didn't notice the time. As God is speaking to us, we want to be vigilant in receiving his messages.

Second, what should we be listening for; i.e., what message is God sending us? It seems to me (and I think I have the ministry behind me on this point) that God has been telling us to prepare. And maybe that's why the Lord has repeated "prepare" many times in His messages. Based on my review of General Church minutes, revelations, and other sources, "prepare" appears over 300 times, including five mentions in the Songs of Zion, with one song totally dedicated to the theme.

But how many reminders do we need? God is a preparer, so we should emulate Him. Notice what is recorded in the Book of Mormon: "I know that the Lord giveth no commandments unto the children of men, save he shall prepare a way for them that they may accomplish the thing which he commandeth them" (1 Nephi 3:7). Another place it says: "But the Lord knoweth all things from the beginning; wherefore, he prepareth a way to accomplish all his works among the children of men" (1 Nephi 9:6).

Now that we have looked at hearing and listening, let's look at the "doing" side of this equation. Jacob wrote: "Prepare your souls for that glorious day when justice shall be administered unto the righteous..." (2 Nephi 9:46). When Alma, Jr. was preaching to the people of Zarahemla (Alma 5) he stirred up their faith by asking them a series of questions. (I call that sermon the "Interrogation of Faith.") I would like to draw your attention to a sample of these questions (paraphrased).

Behold, are ye stripped of pride...Are you stripped of envy? I say unto you, if ye are not ye are not prepared to meet God. Wo unto such an one, for he is not prepared, and the time is at hand that he must repent or he cannot be saved. Behold ye must prepare quickly; for the kingdom of heaven is soon at hand, and such an one hath not eternal life! (Alma 5:29-30)

King Benjamin ended his address to his people by stating: "And finally, I cannot tell you all the things whereby ye may commit sin; for there are divers ways and means, even so many that I cannot number them. But this much I can tell you, that if ye do not watch yourselves, and your thoughts, and your words, and your deeds, and observe the commandments of God, and continue in the faith of what ye have heard concerning the coming of our Lord, even unto the end of your lives, ye must perish. And now, O man, remember, and perish not" (Mosiah 4:29-30)

Among the experiences accepted as revelations from God, there were several that said we must be purified, with the removal of all uncleanness and sin. Preparation begins with asking forgiveness and humbly seeking God. Besides the Scriptures, the Church has many pamphlets, such as Drawing Closer to God, as well as modern media outlets. There are plenty of opportunities to show the fruit of the Spirit (Galatians 5:22).

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Being doers of the Word of God is required, both within the Church and to those who are outside and need Jesus Christ in their lives!

In 1943, a sister in the Church had the following dream. "God told me in a dream to warn the people of The Church of Jesus Christ to prepare, for that destruction is coming upon our land. He said to be faithful and true to the Church and to broadcast to all that would hear the glad tidings of the restored Gospel. We are to live righteously on this earth, be kind and good, to set examples for all the world to see and know that our way is the only way, and our church the only church."

And they cry, "Ah, we knew the day would come,"
And "Praise the Lord, He kept us thru the night."
And "God is good. He brought us thru the wilderness."
And "Let's all thank the Lord that we're alive to see the morning light."

The Spirit we have felt amongst this rising generation of leaders of The Church of Jesus Christ seems to be recurring and congruent every time we gather, whether that be at our last GMBA Campout themed "More Than," or, more recently, the Southeast Region's most recent youth weekend titled "Get In, Reach Out."

The weekend's theme was based on the last verses of Matthew 28: "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost: Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you: and, lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world."

We were instructed that before we can reach out to others as Christ commanded, we must first get into Christ's teachings ourselves.

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Before we had even arrived at the venue, a sister received a revelation from God that proved essential in describing the Spirit we felt throughout our time together:

"This generation is mine. They are full of My Spirit and they move by it. They all have My Spirit. They have My light, even those who have not entered the waters. I have My hands upon them always. I repeat, they are Mine and I am very jealous; they will grow spiritually, I will give them gifts, and they will take My word to all who they can." We thank God that He was ready to start blessing us even before we had arrived.

As most Church events usually begin, the region's fourth youth weekend in the past decade began with some activities led by the youth Friday evening to connect with each other.

Saturday was filled with blessings. We began with a discussion on prayer, followed by a session of prayer that split the group of about fifty into four groups led by young members who had shared thoughts and encouragement about prayer beforehand. Two of the group leaders shared the same scripture to their respective groups without prior discussion:

"Be careful for nothing; but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known unto God. And the peace of God, which passeth all understanding, shall keep your hearts and minds through Christ Jesus" Philippians 4:6-7.

From that prayer service Saturday morning throughout the weekend, we shared this peace that Christ promised more profoundly.

Saturday's prayer session was followed by a series of three workshops. The first was called "Uniting to Christ and the Church." One discussed The Church of Jesus Christ's Great and Divine Commissions and understanding the focus of the Church today. The third discussed having a Christ-centered mindset and holding our standards high in all aspects of our lives.

Christ showed himself through much revelation, most profoundly during our Saturday night meeting. There were three witnesses to Christ's presence and all shared a common description of light shining from Christ to the young people. There are, of course, barriers the evil one tries to put between this generation and their calling, but the Lord reminded us through preaching under the inspiration of His Spirit that the darkness of our earthly trials cannot overshadow the Light of Christ.

Hearing the testimony of the Church is always inspiring. Most memorable from the testimonies shared that Saturday night were those that related to the realization that Christ has already borne the load for us, and we do not have to carry the burdens of life if we just accept His aid in our own personal struggles. One way to think of it was this: Christ already won the battle—we just have to put on the uniform of the winning side.

Anointings after the service seemed to leave each individual who sought with a "find," including the revealing of the gift of tongues to one young man, confirming to him that God would provide the courage he needed to step forward in what the Lord was asking him to do. For another, the gift of tongues and interpretation was given to answer their respective request. Saturday evening was concluded over a bonfire, enjoying the fellowship.

Sunday morning began with a session where the region's young people set mission statements for their lives, tied mostly to growing in the Lord and establishing lives of positive influence to others. We also were asked to decide a way in which we would accomplish such missions. It was shared that when we surrendered our lives to Him, we each were given the Great and Divine commissions as our own mission statements from the mouth of Christ Himself.

As Christ had fish waiting for His disciples on a fire, He also had fish on the fire for each of us, in particular, the two who accepted Him as their Redeemer this weekend. Naiyima Warner asked for her baptism while discussing some things with other young brothers over a campfire we held after the Saturday evening service. Isabella Ortega asked for her lot in the kingdom the afternoon after our Sunday service. Within weeks of our gathering, God also called Mia Difede, Cecelia Murphy, and Kailee Horn.

On behalf of the weekend's attendants, we must praise our Lord for His immeasurable blessings in just the weekend we shared together. We are also thankful for the region's support to make these events possible.

The Lord promised, right before He left the disciples, that he would leave the Holy Spirit with us, and we truly felt that as we sought to "get in" to the Lord's path. We also felt the Savior's commission to spread this gift of salvation with those around us, as He left the disciples with "Go" and "Teach," as recorded in the last two verses of the Gospel of Matthew, to confirm the second part of the weekend's theme, "reach out."

The light turns green, and I can see the smile stays on his face as he begins driving away.

There have been many times in Sofia's short life when she has shown me why Christ tells us to be like children, and this was one of those times. I realized that in my frantic rush to get from home to school to work, I was missing what really

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5 Amazing Facts

Charity

Also referred to as the pure love of Christ, charity is described in 1 Corinthians 13, which is known as the "love chapter." The 5 amazing facts about charity that are listed below come from 1 Corinthians 13: 4-7 and are reiterated in Moroni 7: 45 as part of the chapter on "Faith, Hope and Charity." Based on these verses, we learn that charity is:

Kind - Just the simple act of being kind to one another is a way to demonstrate love. The alternative is to act rudely (behave unseemly) to others which would hardly be the type of behavior to accompany the words saying that they are loved.

Gives the Benefit of the Doubt - How often do we assume the worst about someone? Believing/spreading rumors, attributing good deeds to selfish motives or expecting people to eventually hurt or disappoint us are hardly ways to cultivate loving relationships. Rather, charity encourages us to "think no evil" and "rejoice in the truth."

Selfless – Jesus said, "Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his

friends" (John 15:13). Just as the reason for Christ to give His life was to help others (like us), true charity should be motivated purely by a desire to help others. If the motivation is to boast (vaunt) about what we have done or to be recognized in some way (being prideful or puffed up) or to receive something in return, that is not true charity.

Not Envious – Whether we want to admit it or not, most of us are envious of others who have something we want and they have. Whether it's money, possessions, a desirable job/position in an organization, a spouse, a loving family, or whatever, human nature makes it difficult to be truly happy for someone else who has it if we don't. Only true love/charity for another person can

allow us to be truly happy for them and even celebrate their blessing with them, even if we haven't been blessed with the same thing.

Patient – Even as the Lord is patient with us, forgiving our transgressions and allowing us time to grow, so should we treat others. In the scriptures, "suffer" means to tolerate or allow so suffering long would be to put up with an admittedly imperfect situation, even over a long period of time. The opposite of this is to be "easily provoked" which is to quickly get angry or annoyed. This type of reaction can potentially alter loving relationships, so let's do our best to be patient with each other and exhibit the charity that can be described as the true love of Christ.

I found myself at the grocery store, close to home, unable to catch my breath. I called my wife, Shirley, to come to get me so that I could get home to rest. When she arrived and saw my condition, she called 911. The paramedics transported me to the nearest hospital and determined that my lungs had filled with blood clots and my heart was straining to pump blood through my body—I was having a heart attack. Immediately, they transferred me to a heart hospital an hour from our location to perform delicate surgery.
