## "Isn't It Great to Be Dependent?"

"Fear not, little flock; for it is your Father's good pleasure to give you the Kingdom." (Luke 22:32)

s she was failing physically, my mother was being perfected spiritually. This was unbeknownst to me when she asked an odd question, "Isn't it great to be dependent?" I was ill-prepared for her unprovoked question, answering much too quickly, "No, Mom, I don't like feeling dependent." She replied patiently, lovingly, and with no disapproval, "Honey, you didn't understand me. Isn't it great to be dependent upon God?"


As I've grown older, I understand differently. Given the strange circumstances into which we have all been thrust, her question arrives with newfound clarity. "Yes, Mom, it's glorious to be dependent." This pandemic has me awakening with a prayer on my mind, after falling asleep with a prayer-filled heart. Dependence does that.

We are living in a time when the Word of God is being fulfilled: "Blessed, though compelled to be humble" (Alma 32:15). It's not necessarily by choice, but by circumstance that we feel so dependent upon God's rescue. Just months ago, I was obediently prayerful. Today, I am wonderfully reliant upon God. Peter described our situation, "Be sober, be diligent; because your adversary the devil, as a roaring lion, walketh about, seeking whom he may devour" (I Peter 5:8). Paul approached such a threat, "Finally, be strong in the Lord, and in the power of His might" (Ephesians 6:10). Jesus calmingly comforted, "Take no thought" (Matthew 6:31). He told us not to worry about things that easily bring concerns and worry, because the Creator intimately knows His creation. Jesus explained how God provides protection, nourishment, and raiment for nature, such as ravens or lilies. He iterated and reiterated how God does so much more for us, His followers.

Jesus instructed us not to waste time on these trivialities, as there are much more important things on which we should place our focus, "If ye then be not able to do that thing that is least, why take ye thought for the rest?" (Luke 12:26). He was saying, "Trust me! I have this, so you need not waste time worrying. Believe in God and place your dependence upon Him!" It really is just that simple. He concluded, "But rather seek ye the Kingdom of God; and all these things shall be added unto you. Fear not, little flock; for it is your Father's good pleasure to give you're the Kingdom" (Luke 12:31). He is a proud, good Father, who is happy to give you all you need.

Yes, there is an impending threat somewhere out there, but we've always had reasons to depend upon God's rescue. Maybe, we all have a new-found clarity. God has waited patiently for us to shift from obedient prayer to urgent dependence.

I still hear my mother's question, "Isn't it great to be dependent?" But I now hear the Lord's question also, "Isn't it great to be dependent upon an almighty God, who was, is, and always will be omnipotently dependable?"

Later that year, in October, she passed on to her eternal reward at the age of 96. Ilene had no natural children of her own but was a spiritual mother to me and also many others. She was born in 1915 near Windsor, Ontario, Canada. She said her parents were the first Gentiles baptized into the Church in Canada. At the age of 19 she asked for her baptism and was baptized after the first meeting she attended. They held meetings for about three years in her parents' home until the Windsor Branch was built. When she was 22 her mother passed away and she raised her younger brothers as if she were their mother. Sister Ilene spent Church conferences at the Ashtons' in Coal Valley, Pennsylvania, where she helped cook and care for their company. When she was 27 she married Charles Smith in Glassport, Pennsylvania, and was ordained a deaconess later that year. She was a faithful member of the Ladies' Uplift Circle and attended the 101st Circle Conference in Glassport in 1945. Ilene and Charles were missionaries near Independence, Missouri in their later years. They cast many seeds and made many friends who attended meetings in their home. Sister Ilene told many experiences and always carried a sweet spirit.

is sister called. Then his mother called 5 minutes later. She asked me to go the hospital to anoint him, explaining the dire situation, as he had taken a dangerously bad turn. She described her worst fears as, "never getting my son back to normal." She ended the call warning me he would resist my prayers as he adamantly kept telling her he no longer believed in God.

Upon arrival, I was told to empty my pockets and remove my belt before being escorted by an attendant into the psychiatric ward. The attendant never left my side. I approached my beautiful young congregant, who looked right through me, exhibiting no recognition of me. This unnerved me, and although afterwards the attendant assured me he never saw anything telling, I fully experienced my frailty facing off with this young man. Furthermore, the young man showed no evidence he was even listening. I finally said, "I came here to pray for you," and he immediately thrust his hands out so I could hold them. The attendant flinched, but remained beside me. Standing in this populated general room, we held onto

one another as I prayed. Moments later, we went to his own room where he regressed, opening and closing drawers that didn't exist, moving unseen items around, and talking nonsensically.

I had driven to the hospital in faith, believing God would take care of this young man. However, once I gazed into his unresponsive eyes, I was tempted by wavering belief. But as I prayed for him, all of that was taken. Later I learned that an hour after I left, he fell asleep and slept soundly for the first time in 3 days. He awakened to complete cognition, healed completely.

The Savior was approached by a desperate man who explained how his son had been given what were probably seizures, since he had been "of a child." When overtaken, the young man was uncontrollable, at times falling into the most dangerous of surroundings (ex: "fire," "water," etc.). Jesus challenged him conditionally, "If thou canst believe, all things are possible..." Mark 9:24 states the father answered immediately ("straightway"), but he must have first considered his years of outreach to others, which always ended in failure. He must have contemplated life's troubling lessons about trust. Yet he found the courage and the strength to answer, through his tears, "Lord, I believe; help thou mine unbelief!"

How I understand! Can you? Do you find yourself faith-filled...most of the time? Some have said they feel strong during daylight, but later, in the evenings, weakness creeps in. If you find that happening, just remember that minister who stood in solitude, experiencing doubts created by his own humanness. Then remember how the Savior intervened and saved both the young man and the minister in the same moment. Remember the man who faced the Savior, filled with spiritual faith, while tempted with natural doubts. Then remember how the Savior stepped in and healed the boy and the father in the same instance.

We are faith-filled! We will absolutely get through this present circumstance. If, and when, doubt attacks your peace, remember that the Savior will intervene and rescue you in that very second!

## A Different Kind of Redemption

hen I think of the word "redemption," the scriptural examples that come to mind are the returning prodigal, the debtor forgiven, the lost sheep found, the workman receiving his appointed penny. But an account I heard a while ago painted redemption in a different light, and caused me to ponder the extent of God's love and mercy.

One of our brothers in Christ had discovered a stray dog living in the alley behind his backyard. He could see that the gaunt, sickly animal wouldn't survive for long in that environment. He also soon learned that the dog would growl threateningly if approached. But he really wanted to rescue this dog from its miserable existence. Finally, he enticed the starving animal into his yard with food, then, walking around to the alley from the side street, he closed the back gate, shutting the dog in the yard. From then on he kept the dog safe, and provided food, water, and shelter from the elements.

Not surprisingly, the dog didn't appreciate the gate closing, and though it lived out its life in that backyard, never did become the family pet. Given where it had come from, what did that dog know of gratitude or affection? Its initial reaction was that of someone who was taken captive. The dog must have felt trapped; it could not process that it had been rescued from the hazards and privation of living in the streets. It took time for that dog to be at ease in that safe place, to accept the care and protection of its kind benefactor. Only very gradually did the dog learn to trust, eventually allowing itself to be approached and even petted by its new owner.

Hearing this story, I thought about what drove our brother to come to that animal's rescue. The dog had no redeeming qualities to speak of—it was emaciated, hurting, likely infested and/or diseased. Angry on the outside, and no doubt fearful on the inside—incapable of forming relationships, returning affection, or providing companionship. I saw it as a parable of the way the Lord intervenes in our lives.

"But God commendeth his love toward us, in that, while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us" (Romans 5:8). Love compelled (and compels) the Lord to rescue the spiritually and emotionally lost. Even those who are broken, filled with hurt and bitterness, whose fears render them incapable of feeling, have a place at the Lord's table. And as we look at the world today, we're likely to find that the broken, hurt, and bitter souls who need the Lord are as numerous as ever.

Similar to the reaction of the dog in the story, it's not reasonable to expect a hurting person—one who is relationally scarred or undeveloped—to respond to their redemption in the "ordinary" way. While everyone comes to the Lord of their own free will, a broken person's demeanor at their baptism might be sullen, rather than appearing joyful or grateful. At that moment, they may feel numb; it might feel to them as if they were turning themself in to the authorities, not understanding yet that their Captor is their Deliverer, not able to see God smiling down at them, not realizing that they have come to dwell in the King's house, will be eating at the King's table, and shall be followed by goodness and mercy all the days of their life.

While the personal Salvation so freely offered through Jesus Christ ought to be a source of unspeakable joy and gratitude, we need to realize that not everyone comes to the Lord with the capacity to form a relationship. Many will need to grow—relationally, spiritually, emotionally—at their own pace, in the context of their own circumstances. For some, redemption might feel like being taken prisoner—of their own will, and for their own eternal good. They may not be resisting arrest, but they don't exactly appear eager to be led away. "Who could have supposed that our God would have been so merciful as to have snatched us from our awful, sinful, and polluted state?" (Alma 26:17). Let us always remember that God's love extends even to such as these.

### YODA:

It is easy to get caught up in sin from the world around us. Whether it be trends on social media, or talk at work, sin is all around us, and it is important to listen to the Holy Spirit and do the will of God. Just as Yoda talked about the Light Force being stronger than the Dark Force, we must remember our Lord is **much stronger** than the world. "Greater is he that is in you, than he that is in the world" (1 John 4:4).

Immediately I was reminded of the Fruits of the Spirit (*Galatians 5:22-23*), and similarly as the Jedis following the "Light Force," we are taught as saints to be led by the Spirit of God, and not by the Flesh of this world, as we see so many do around us.

As there are many characters in the bible that

we individually favor, a person in Star Wars that growing up I always loved was Mace Windu. He was the coolest. Jesus teaches us in scripture NOT to do this. 

# The Importance of the Resurrection of Jesus Christ

ometimes when we write an article for the Gospel News we start with one idea and the Spirit of God leads us in another direction. That is the case with this article. I started an article reminiscing about an item written by Evangelist Alvin Swanson and published in the Gospel News about 50 years ago. The title of his article was: There Is No Easter! Wow, talk about an attentiongrabbing title! He laid out in the article the timeline of Jesus's death and resurrection. Since that article was printed, I have observed that others have come to the same conclusions, including Messianic Jews. Now, many people hold the opinion that the Romans crucified Jesus on Wednesday, Joseph of Arimathea then buried him, the rulers placed guards at the tomb, and that on Saturday at 6:00 PM, Jesus resurrected.

In any case, as I said, sometimes the Spirit of God leads us to other subjects. I was led to the following seven points:

- Jesus brought about the concept of eternal life through the resurrection. Jesus said to the Sadducees: "But as touching the resurrection of the dead, have ye not read that which was spoken unto you by God, saying, I am the God of Abraham, and the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob? God is not the God of the dead, but of the living" (Matthew 22:31, 32).
- 2. Jesus' resurrection brought about the fulfillment of prophecies. Apostle Paul wrote: "For I delivered unto you first of all that which I also received, how that Christ died for our sins according to the scriptures; And that he was buried, and that he rose again the third day according to the scriptures" (1 Corinthians 15:3, 4).
- 3. Jesus gave us hope in the resurrection. "Neither can they die anymore: for they are equal unto the angels; and are the children of God, being the children of the resurrection" (Luke 20:36).
- 4. Jesus taught that the good and the evil will resurrect someday. "And shall come forth; they that have done good, unto the resurrection of life; and

Another quotation of Mother Teresa elaborates. (It's rather long, but worth reading!)


"People are often unreasonable, irrational, and self-centered

These words were written by Mother Teresa, but they are supported by scripture. A few takeaways from this passage are :

Forgive and be kind. Colossians 3: 12&13: "Put on therefore, as the elect of God, holy and beloved, bowels of mercies, kindness, humbleness of mind, meekness, longsuffering; Forbearing one another, and forgiving one another, if any man have a quarrel against any: even as Christ forgave you, so also do ye."

Be honest. Ephesians 4: 24&25: "...put on the new man, which after God is created in righteousness and true holiness. Wherefore putting away lying,



speak every man truth with his neighbor."

Be happy. Il Nephi 2:25: "...and men are, that they might have joy."

Do good. Psalm 37: 3: "Trust in the Lord, and do good; so shalt thou dwell in the land, and verily thou shalt be fed."

Give your best. Colossians 3:23: "And whatsoever ye do, do it heartily." Titus 2:7: "In all things showing thyself a pattern of good works."

# Ah, We Knew the Day Would Come!

aiting is never easy, but waiting a long time for something is especially difficult. In the past year our Church meeting places were closed for only a few months but it seemed like forever as we waited for them to reopen. But when the day finally came that we were able to return to Church—What a wonderful feeling! Ah, we knew the day would come! Here are 5 amazing facts that describe scriptural events that people had to wait for (or are still waiting for)—the waiting time for these was (is) significantly longer than a few months.

**Freedom from Bondage in Egypt** – The Book of Exodus begins with the Israelites in bondage in Egypt. They are made aware that God will send a deliverer to lead them out of bondage but, as the years go by, they have to question whether it will ever happen. Finally, after waiting for over 400 years, the day comes when Moses leads the Israelites out of Egypt and toward the promised land of Canaan.

**Freedom from Bondage of Sin** – From the time that the first man introduces sin into the world, people look forward to the fulfillment of the prophecies that God will send a Messiah to make a way for the salvation of mankind. It takes a few thousand years but, on a quiet night in Bethlehem, the angel announces, "I bring you good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people. For unto you is born this day..." (Luke 2:10-11).

**Restoration of the Gospel** – For 1,260 years, there is no priesthood authority on the earth. The world goes through a period of time known as the "Dark Ages". Finally, in the 1820s, a young man named Joseph Smith is visited by an angel and, a few years later—Hallelujah, the Gospel is restored!

Choice Seer and Zion – The next event(s) we are waiting for are the emergence of the Choice Seer (see 2 Nephi 3) and the establishment of Zion. Those of us who have been in the Church for many years have been waiting a long time to see the convincing of the Seed of Joseph (by the Choice Seer) and the beginning of a glorious Peaceful Reign. they that have done evil, unto the resurrection of damnation" (John 5:29).

- 5. Jesus wanted the resurrection of the body and soul to be the cornerstone of our faith. "And with great power gave the apostles witness of the resurrection of the Lord Jesus: and great grace was upon them all" (Acts 4:33).
- 6. Jesus wanted us to know that our future mirrors His. "For if we have been planted together in the likeness of his death, we shall be also in the likeness of his resurrection" (Romans 6:5; Revelation 20:6).
- 7. The concept of the resurrection is not some crazy philosophy, but a reality for which we strive (Acts 17:16 32; 2 Timothy 2:12).

Although I could quote scores of scriptures regarding the resurrection, from both Bible and Book of Mormon, here's the bottom line, as spoken by the prophet Lehi almost 600 years before Jesus was born: "Therefore, how great the importance to make these things known unto the inhabitants of the earth, that they may know that there is no flesh that can dwell in the presence of God, save it be through the merits, and mercy, and grace of the Holy Messiah, who layeth down his life according to the flesh, and taketh it again by the power of the Spirit, that he may bring to pass the resurrection of the dead, being the first that should rise" (2 Nephi 2:8). And Mormon added the following admonition, "And what is it that ye shall hope for? Behold I say unto you that ye shall have hope through the atonement of Christ and the power of his resurrection, to be raised unto life eternal, and this because of your faith in him according to the promise" (Moroni 7:41).
