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CELEBRATION: THE GIFTS OF JESUS

A Message from the Quorum of Twelve Apostles

ecember is a happy month dominated by the Christmas season and the New Year holiday. As children, we looked forward to this season for many months each year. As adults, our thoughts and activities drift toward preparation for the holidays well in advance of the fun. While the birth of Jesus is the nominal reason for the season, many people have allowed a focus on Christmas gifting, along with feasting, decorating, and otherwise celebrating, to eclipse the significance of the birth of our Savior.

Occasions for giving and receiving gifts stand tall among all of our favorite things. In the very early history of man, gift giving was often associated with formation of relationships whereby mutual support and protection were expected. History also records the giving of gifts as an act of respect or obeisance by persons given audience before royalty. Per the scriptural account (Matthew 2:1-12), wise men followed a star to find the young child-born-King, Jesus, and after worshipping Him, presented precious gifts.

Whenever we give gifts, the pleasure for the giver comes from the appreciation of the one who receives. Think of the times you have thought and thought to come up with the perfect gift for someone you love and how you waited with bated breath to see that loved one's joy upon receiving it. When gifting is at its best it is impossible to determine whether it is better to give or to receive. In fact, the Apostle Paul, speaking to the Ephesians (Acts 20:35), reminded them of Christ's teaching, "It is more blessed to give than to receive." Looking closely at this in context, we find that Paul was expressing his joy in bringing them the Gospel. He had sought no remuneration or material reward, but only looked for their appreciation of his giving shown by their continuation of his example, modeled after Christ's.

Earlier, we referred to the scriptural account of gifts associated with the birth of Christ. Pagan customs also embraced gift giving to celebrate birthdays of pagan deities. One of the most relevant of such customs, the feast of Saturnalia, was a Roman feast celebrating the birth of Saturn on December 25 (later changed to a December 17–23 festival). The scriptures do not specify the birth date of Jesus (many studies have suggested various dates based upon prophesy), but it was not an accident that by the fourth century, the Roman celebration of His birth came to officially replace the pagan holiday on the same date. Historians suggest that this "merger" of cultural religion with Christianity was a convenience for the comfort of Roman converts, allowing them to cling to traditions that honored a pagan deity while nominally celebrating in the name of Christ.

Over the centuries, many have argued whether or not this was significant. Today, it seems safe to assume that no one is thinking about Saturn as Christmas gifts are being exchanged. So, let us not be obsessed over the questionable validity of a date chosen many, many centuries ago. Meanwhile, however, it may be good to be wary of the potential for modern commercial, secular celebrations of Christmas to be overplayed in ways equivalent to the Roman decisions. As Saints who know Jesus, keep the season in perspective; enjoy the time appropriately while we exalt our Lord every day of our lives, not only at this time of year. When we think about gifts, let us remember what God gave.

Jesus understood gifting. He taught and demonstrated giving continually. To Nicodemus he said, For God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life. To His disciples He said, Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends. He was so continually prepared to give that, at the mere touch of his garment by a believing woman in need, virtue went forth from Him and healed her (Mark 5:25-30).

Faith in Christ affords us all of God's gifts, Salvation being the greatest. Jesus Christ, during His short residence on Earth, showed us—for our sakes—that the Spirit of God can overcome the flesh and supersede the laws of nature. He related His Gospel in teachings backed up by demonstrations in action and power. While teaching Faith, Hope, and Charity, He was continually giving: healing the lame and blind, raising the dead, feeding the multitudes, and more. Jesus wants us to sustain His brand of giving. He made some profound promises to believers, including: ... He that believeth on me, the works that I do shall he do also; and greater works than these shall he do;... and whatsoever ye shall (Continued on page 3)

cold, steady rain led into the weekend. But with temperatures rising into the 50s, Saturday, December 2, was blessed with unseasonably warm and sunny weather on what would become a perfect day for the Annual Saline Christmas Parade – thirty-three years ago this month. ask in my name, that will I do, that the Father may be glorified in the Son. (John 14:12-13) What are the circumstances that enable mere men and women to emulate the giving of Christ?

When Peter and John encountered the lame man begging alms at the Gate Beautiful, they were able to share the healing gift of God with him, commanding him in the name of Jesus to rise and walk. Certainly, this was among the works Jesus had foretold, but how did they manage it? Read the passage (Acts 3:1-8): The miracle occurred; the man was able to get up and walk. Presumably his entire life changed from that point on.

The account suggests that Peter and John were totally prepared for an encounter like this, as there was only the briefest pause to assess the situation prior to action. Confronting them was a man who had severe need. He was lame and poor, without the means to earn wages or otherwise provide for himself; he was reaching out to them for help as he had reached out to many other passersby among whom some helped, and many did not. Peter and John were disciples of Jesus Christ, endowed not with great wealth but with the Spirit of God AND the promise of doing works like those they had seen Jesus do or even greater. The account tells us that Peter and John believed Jesus, felt access to the Power of God, and gave that which they had.

This is an impressive story of the Gospel in action during the earliest days of the Church after the Day of Pentecost. Most of us have heard it preached and taught many, many times. How do we regard the account? Is it perceived as a part of days gone by, a beautiful history, or is it an example no less possible today than it was 2000 years ago?

The Case For Christ: Holding The "Word Up" By Elder Doug Obradovic



Is reading scripture difficult for you?

Do the "thees" and "thous" make Christ's words seem irrelevant,
even losing their potency in translation?

Let's take a deeper dive into Jesus' message and see if we can make sense of it all.
If successful, let's agree to hold the "Word Up"!

"Upon this rock will I build my Church" (Matthew 16:18).

o you remember shaking wrapped gifts under the tree before Christmas, in an attempt to discover the contents? Do you remember finally opening the one you thought was that special gift and once opened, discovering that it was? The wait was worth it all once you saw the result!

The television show, "Extreme Makeover," had a similar effect, spending 53 minutes teasing the viewer about what might be uncovered in the final scene. And then Ty Pennington would shout, "Move that bus!" and the neighborhood and all watching would scream with delight as the final home renovations were revealed.

There is a much greater reveal awaiting you. Matthew writes (16:13-23), Jesus asked His disciples, 'Whom do men say that I, the Son of man, am? And they said, 'Some say that thou art John the Baptist: some, Elias; and others, Jeremias, or one of the prophets.' He saith unto them, 'But whom say ye that I am?' And Simon Peter answered, 'Thou art the Christ, the Son of the living God.' And Jesus answered and said unto him, 'Blessed art thou, Simon Barjona: for flesh and blood hath not revealed it unto thee, but my Father which is in heaven.' And I say also unto thee, That 'thou art Peter, and upon this rock I will build my church...."

When probed, the disciples told Jesus He was being described many different ways, but when Jesus asked Peter who he believed He was, Peter said, "Thou art the Christ, the Son of the living God." Knowing God had revealed this to Peter, Jesus introduced the Church's foundation as the rock of revelation ("upon this rock I will build my church").

When experienced firsthand, the revelation of God certainly is as a firm as rock and cannot be denied. Today Christ still honors His foundation promise via His voice, dreams, visions, healings, angels, miracles and/or extraordinary answers to prayers. No television show or unwrapped gift can come close to the creating the excitement one feels through God's heaven-sent revelations.

st importantly, they are available to each of us. When we place our trust in God, He gives generously. Sometimes we struggle, wondering whether we're worthy of His blessings. Please allow me to help you with your questioning. You're not! But then, none of us are. However, when we submit to His mercy, we are made worthy by the grace of Jesus Christ. Know this: God still speaks to His people and He wants to bless His own. He awaits our humbly begging Him to "Move that bus!" And when He does, just wait until you see what's behind it: the greatest reveal of all!

Let us go back to John 14, Jesus speaking to His disciples, continuing with verse 15: If ye love me, keep my commandments. And I will pray the Father, and he shall give you another Comforter, that he may abide with you for ever. Even the Spirit of truth; whom the world cannot receive, because it seeth him not, neither knoweth him: but ye know him; for he dwelleth with you, and shall be in you...Yet a little while, and the world seeth me no more; but ye see me: because I live, ye shall live also. At that day ye shall know that I am in my Father, and ye in me, and I in you. He that hath my commandments, and keepeth them, he it is that loveth me: and he that loveth me shall be loved of my Father, and I will love him, and I will manifest myself to him.

In these words, Jesus elaborated on the concept of belief in Him. The elements of loving Him and continuing in accord with His commandments are tied to the mutual co-dwelling of Christ-in-Father, Believer-in-Christ, and Christ-in-Believer. While Jesus prepared His disciples for His pending departure from this life, He also offered them an understanding of how that apparent void would not actually come to pass because that Spirit, the Comforter, the Spirit of Truth, the Holy Ghost, is promised to in-dwell the loving faithful even so wonderfully as to be accompanied by manifestations of Jesus.

How much of this was really being absorbed by the disciples at the time the words were spoken? Their behavior immediately after Jesus was crucified proved that they were still made of flesh and blood and governed by carnal minds. But Jesus knew that they loved Him, and He worked with them to prove His resurrection and remind them of all else that He had said; for example:

- He left two angels in the sepulcher, and appeared to Mary
- He appeared to the disciples in the upper room and showed them his hands and side
- He breathed on them and pronounced the Holy Ghost upon them
- He patiently made a special repeat visit for Thomas who doubted the account of his Colleagues
- He came to them as they fished, frustrated, in the sea of Tiberius, instructing them tocast their nets on the right side and astounding them with the miraculous catch which prepared them, specifically Peter, for the question: ...lovest thou me more than these?
- He appeared alive over a period of forty days following His passion and spoke of things pertaining to the kingdom of God and promised them that they would...receive power, after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you: and ye shall be witnesses unto me both inJerusalem, and in all Judaea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth.

Consider how glorious that 40-day period must have been! Can you imagine how many rearrangements of life, cancelled appointments, and changed plans developed during those days which indelibly confirmed the Resurrection and prepared the disciples to operate as the Church in one accord? This unification culminated in the famous Day of Pentecost when the gifts of the Holy Ghost rushed in as a mighty wind, appeared as cloven tongues of fire, filled them all, and gave them utterance in many languages with understanding by all.

It was from this preparation and unity and in this Spirit that we find Peter and John traversing the Gate Beautiful and giving of the gifts they had been given. Here and now in the 21st century, the point of this message is not to attack the date we designate as Christmas nor any reasonable celebrations. The important thing—and the point of this message—is that we Saints have the advantage of the Restored Gospel—a gift from God for us to appreciate. God's plan included the Restoration to replace the lost understandings, to restore the Word, and to correct any misapplications of the Gospel that Christ originally demonstrated and taught. He provided a refreshed, solid foundation for His Church, His Saints, upon which we can base and build our lives serving Him in Spirit and in Truth and sharing all of His gifts as He would have them enjoyed—every day.

Christmas Time By Evangelist Mark Kovacic

this time of year we enjoy the decorations and music of Christmas. People smile and pleasantly greet one another. People seem to treat each other better. Sometimes we ask ourselves why it can't be like this all year long. We are reminded that Jesus is the reason for the season. Yet we know that Jesus was not born in December and much of the Christmas Holiday season is simply tradition. These traditions have been passed down from prior generations and encapsulate many misunderstandings of the birth of the Messiah of Israel.

My purpose here is not to debate the value of these traditions or the true date of Jesus' birth. Neither of these points are important. What is important is what the birth of Jesus meant to His contemporaries and what it means to us today.

Let's consider the witnesses of His birth - those who were participants in the great plan of redemption. Pieces of the story are given in the first two chapters of Matthew and Luke. After Mary accepted her role as the mother of the promised Messiah, she went to visit her cousin, Elizabeth. Filled with the Holy Ghost, Elizabeth said to Mary, "And whence is this to me that the mother of my Lord should come to me?"

The night Jesus was born, shepherds were watching over their sheep and an angel appeared to them and the glory of the Lord shone around them. The angel said, "Fear not; for behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people." The angel explained that a Savior was born, who was the Messiah (Christ). Then appearing with the angel was a whole group of angels glorifying God and singing, "Peace on earth and good will towards all." The shepherds decided that this was worth seeing and left their flocks. They went to Bethlehem and found the baby with Mary and Joseph. What is more important is what happened next. Luke wrote, "And when they had seen it, they made known abroad the saying which was told them [by the angel] concerning this child." They testified of what God showed them, what the angels said, and what they witnessed: a Savior and Messiah.

While Joseph and Mary were still in Bethlehem, wise men came to worship Jesus as the one who was born "King of the Jews." (Jesus' death matched his birth when 34 years later Pontius Pilate put the title "King of Jews" on Jesus' cross.) These wise men were led to the manger by a new star they saw in the sky. Strange that the scribes and priests in Jerusalem did not understand the importance of the star that had led these wise men from a foreign land. (I guess they forgot Numbers 24:17.) The wise men recognized the importance of the star and Him to which it belonged – the One born as a king.

Joseph and Mary went to Jerusalem, according to the Law of Moses, to offer a sacrifice and to have Jesus circumcised. There they met two people, Simeon and Anna, who were moved by the Holy Ghost to witness Jesus' coming. Simeon was told by the Holy Ghost he would not die until he saw "the Lord's Christ." Prompted by the Spirit, he went to the Temple, saw Jesus, and took Him into his arms, and praised God saying, "Mine eyes have seen thy salvation, which thou hast prepared before the face of all people; a light to lighten the Gentiles and the glory of thy people israel."

Anna, of the tribe of Asher, was a prophetess living in Jerusalem. She too was prompted by the Spirit and gave thanks to the Lord and witnessed to all those who were nearby that were looking for the redemption in Jerusalem that the Redeemer had come.

So what does this all mean to us and what should we do? First, it shows how the great plan of redemption was prepared by God from the beginning and that like many of His doings He prepares the way before a great event.

Second, it shows that God uses men and women to announce His intentions and actions. What better testimony than a person who has witnessed the works of God! We become the shepherds, the wise men, the prophet and prophetess to our families, friends, neighbors and even strangers who are seeking a life with meaning and purpose. We testify to others of the rising of the day star, the bright and morning star II Peter 1:19 and Revelation 22:16). We become the seeds of peace on earth and good will for all.

Let the New Star of Jesus shine through us in these dark times, announcing salvation to a world in need of the Prince of Peace, the King of kings, an advocate and a counsellor.

the first article in this series described different types of prisons we may find ourselves in, only some of which include physical bars. If we were to ever find ourselves in handcuffs or chains, physical or otherwise, what would have to happen in order to be freed from them? The answer: Somebody else (someone with the keys) would have to free us.

In the case of the "innermost prison," Jesus is the One who holds the keys and offers freedom. He holds the keys of hell and death (Revelation 1:18). He came to open the prison to those who are bound (Isaiah 61:1). He offers us the keys to the kingdom of heaven (Matthew 16:19). By His death on the cross, Jesus freed us from sin. By His resurrection, He freed us from death. There is nobody else who qualifies to free us from this prison. Jesus is the only one who holds the keys:

And under this head ye are made free, and there is no other head whereby ye can be made free. There is no other name given whereby salvation cometh; therefore, I would that ye should take upon you the name of Christ (Mosiah 5:8).

Yes, even in this age of political correctness where nobody is supposed to think that their way is the only way, the words of Jesus still ring out, "I am the way, the truth, and the life: no man cometh unto the Father, but by me" (John 14:6).

Exactly what is it that Jesus has made us free to do?

First and foremost, He has made us "free to choose liberty and eternal life, through the great mediation of all men, or to choose captivity and death, according to the captivity and power of the devil" (II Nephi 2:27). Without Jesus, there is no choice-captivity/death is the only option. With Jesus, we have the option to choose liberty and eternal life. Note that it's not forced on anyone-you still have to choose it, but we have the ability to make that choice because of Christ.

Once we choose the Lord, we are instantly freed from the guilt we have carried for past sins. We are freed from the eternal consequences we would have had to face for those sins. We are freed from the fear of looking ahead to a judgment day on which we would be judged guilty and condemned to an eternity separated from God. Replacing the guilt and fear are feelings of peace and joy, freeing us to live a blessed life.

Even when hard times come (and they will), we can take comfort in knowing that the Lord is there for us and that we will ultimately be victorious because Jesus has already won the victory. Jesus wants all of His followers to understand that the victory has already been won so that we can enjoy peace in this life:

These things I have spoken unto you, that in me ye might have peace. In the world ye shall have tribulation: but be of good cheer; I have overcome the world (John 16:33).

If you're a sports fan (or you know someone who is), think about the emotions that surface during a big game. When your team suffers a setback, you get upset. Moments of elation when your team is winning can quickly turn to feelings of despair when they fall behind. As the game approaches the end and it appears your team may not win, feelings of anxiety arise. On the whole, it can be a very draining experience.

However, imagine that you are watching a recording of the game after it has been played and you already know that your team has won the game. Your viewing experience is totally different as you won't get upset when your team suffers a setback, you won't worry when your team is behind and you won't be anxious as the end of the game approaches. Instead, you will just enjoy the game, knowing that in the end, your team wins!

This is the type of life Jesus has freed us to live. By knowing how the story ends, we don't have to dwell on setbacks in life, bumps in the road, trials of our faith, etc. The peace of knowing that we win in the end frees us to choose to focus on the blessings of life instead of the setbacks.

In addition to knowing the end of the story, God's servants also benefit from knowing what is acceptable to Him and what is not. The scriptures and the Holy Ghost provide this insight. Knowing the "boundaries" creates significant freedom.

I once visited New York City and went to the top of the World Trade Center before it was destroyed. It stood over 100 stories high. On the roof of the building, there were large railings and fences all around to prevent anybody from falling off. Normally, people think of being fenced in as a restriction. Yet, in this case, the barriers gave me the freedom to move around freely and enjoy the breathtaking view from all sides. Had there been no fences, I would have been afraid to take one step up there. The fences may have taken away my option of experiencing the thrill of a 1000 foot freefall, but I didn't mind the sacrifice.

In order to live within the boundaries of God, all we have to do when we are considering a course of action is eliminate options that we know would displease God. Once we've narrowed down the options in this way, we can feel complete freedom to choose from all remaining options. Of course, the consequences of each option need to be considered ("You are free to choose, but you are not free from the consequence of your choice"), but the choice is truly up to you. Just as the fences on the roof of the World Trade Center made visitors free to enjoy the view, knowing the boundaries of God allows us to feel free to enjoy life.

We are so blessed to be aligned with Jesus Christ, the One who holds the keys to the innermost prison! We have been made free in so many ways—free from the fear and sting of death, free from the guilt and eternal consequence of sin, free to choose our eternal home, free to enjoy a blessed life. Those who don't know the Lord may think they are free, but as Jesus said, "If the Son therefore shall make you free, ye shall be free indeed" (John 8:36).

he Great Commission to the Church was clearly laid by Jesus Christ. Just prior His ascension, He commanded the apostles, "Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature. And, as for the seventy whom Christ also appointed, He "sent them two and two before his face into every city and place" as "lambs among the wolves" proclaiming that the "kingdom of God is come nigh unto you." Here are five amazing facts – that stood witness to Holy Ghost which accompanied these early saints –and to this day stand for all men and women called to fulfill the Great Commission:

- God's Grace: "Carry neither purse, nor scrip, nor shoes: and salute no man by the way. And if the son of peace be there, your peace shall rest upon it...in the same house remain, eating and drinking such things as they give: for the labourer is worthy of his hire."
- Power over Satan: "And he said unto them, I beheld Satan as lightning fall from heaven. Behold, I give unto you power to tread on serpents and scorpions, and over all the power of the enemy: and nothing shall by any means hurt you."




