EVANGELIST ORDAINED By Sister Kim Komjathy

unday, June 2, 2013 will be a day long remembered, when the saints gathered at Detroit Branch #1 for the ordination of Brother Daniel Mora into the Quorum of 70 evangelists. That would have been blessing enough, but God had much more planned for us that day.

We received a wonderful surprise a week earlier when Sister Jacky Harris rendered obedience to God's calling. Brother Jerry Chambers baptized her early that morning. Afterward, our joy was complete when at the start of the meeting, hands were laid on her for the bestowal of the Holy Ghost and our new sister became part of the Body of Christ.

A second blessing came in the form of a baby blessing when Brother Jerry Benyola held his great-grandson, Giovanni Gerald Amalio, in his arms and followed the example of Christ by offering a special blessing on the child.

We were honored to have four of our brother apostles in attendance: Paul Liberto, Isaac Smith, Peter Scolaro, and Leonard Lovalvo, in addition to visiting Evangelists Miguel Bicelis and Tony Ricci as well as some of Brother Daniel's family from California. A wonderful Spirit entered into the building that was completely filled with the saints and visitors as the meeting began.

Brother John Straccia, an evangelist in the Great Lakes Region, began the ordination service by explaining that to evangelize means "to preach or proclaim the Gospel." He shared that Jesus Christ set the pattern we follow by choosing 70 men with the specific task of going out and sharing the good news to others, the same number of men that were called by the Lord to be priests of Israel in the days of Moses. He explained that we follow the same pattern today, looking for God to reveal those being called into this office and looking for the fruit or evidence that often appears long before the ordination occurs. Such was the case with Brother Daniel himself, having the spirit of evangelism at home and in foreign fields.

Some outstanding evangelists from the past were mentioned and the congregation was introduced to the current evangelists of the Great Lakes Region, along with their involvement in the work of the Church: Brothers Lyle Criscuolo, Lou Vitto, Frank Vitto, Frank Natoli, Tom Everett, Michael LaSala, Alex Gentile, Nephi DeMercurio, and John Straccia.

Brother Frank Natoli followed by explaining that the 70 evangelists are made up of members in the United States and from foreign lands. He further explained that when an evangelist passes, the remaining quorum members seek out God's revelation in sincere prayer to fill that quorum. This was the case for Brother Daniel. At a meeting in March of this year, when experiences regarding his calling were being read, the Spirit of God filled the room so powerfully, that the reader could hardly finish. Later, at the General Church Conference Center, when Brother Daniel entered the room of interviewing evangelists, the Spirit of God enveloped the brothers, confirming his calling.

Brother Alex Gentile continued, offering some words regarding the joys but also the often difficult work and conditions that our evangelists face in the mission fields, and some of the wonderful experiences he witnessed while doing missionary work.



Is reading scripture difficult for you?

Do the "thees" and "thous" make Christ's words seem irrelevant, even losing their potency in translation?

Let's take a deeper dive into Jesus' message and see if we can make sense of it all.

If successful, let's agree to hold the "Word Up"!

"That they all may be one; as thee, Father, art in me, and I in thee, that they also may be in us:
that the world may believe that thou hast sent me" (John 17:21).

rue harmony is daunting! The most important grade in elementary school wasn't in Reading, 'Riting or 'Rithmetic, but in "Plays Well with Others." The only One qualified to assess "plays well with others" provided hope that this unity was both achievable and expected, and Jesus Christ set the bar just that high.

This snippet from Jesus's prayer includes a challenge to duplicate the standard He and His father set, "as thee, Father, art in me, and I in thee." Our life experiences cause this to seem unattainable as few rarely enjoy complete togetherness. Offering His prayer at the end of a life filled with difficult relationships helps us realize Christ was aware of such human frailties and in spite of this, He confidently stated, "that they ALL may be ONE."

I have found the challenge in uniting with others is never me; it's always OTHERS! "Others" think differently than I do. "Others" speak differently than I do. "Others" do things differently than I do. If "others" would give in to my way of thinking, speaking, and doing, oneness would be ours. Sound familiar? See, we're already unified in thinking we are each the other's problem.

Maybe the challenge for all of us is that all of us think the problem is all of "them." Since we are each other's "others" then each of us are each other's problem. Since all of us are to blame, then we must look higher than each other to find the answer. The answer comes in submission. The word of God (James 4:7) instructs, "Submit yourselves therefore to God. Resist the devil." Our desire to be right (pride-filled) is submitting to the devil, who celebrates our discord. The key is found in the original verse, "that they also might be in us." We will never find togetherness in our friendships, marriages, or other relationships until we give up our need to be right. Right (righteousness) is found within God, and if all of us (this only works if we all do so) submit to our heavenly Father, the harmony promised in Christ's prayer will be ours. We can fulfill the promise found at the end of this verse, "the world may believe." Such unbelievable love causes the unbelievers to believe because such oneness is not earthly. As such, common discord will drive them from Christ. On this, can we agree?

Meet the Branch

Domestic Church — Cape Coral, FL Branch



he Cape Coral Branch started when Brother Jack and Sister Bertha Constantine moved to Cape Coral, Florida in 1964. Shortly thereafter, Sister Geraldine and William Gawronski, along with Brother Ross and Sister Phil Bartuccio and their son Dennis, also moved to the area. Along with Evangelist Brother Alvin Swanson and his wife, Sister Viola, and Alvin Swanson, Jr., the mission was started. We met in the homes, the Yacht Club, and then a bank building until 1997 when our church building was constructed.

Our elders are Brothers Alvin (Skip) Swanson, Gerald Hildenbrand, and Anthony Micale. Brother Anthony and his wife, Sister Lydia, are also missionaries in Italy and spend time there spreading the Gospel (see Blessing Bit).

At present, we have 20 members. In addition to our Sunday worship service, we have M.B.A, Sunday School, and Ladies' Circle, and once a month we have a fasting and prayer meeting followed by a fellowship breakfast.

We praise God for the many healings we have had and many answered prayers for employment. We have been fasting and praying to increase our membership. We are also praying for additional ordained workers.

International Church — Quito, Ecuador



he mission in Quito, Ecuador currently has 10 baptized members and two ordained officers. The ages in the group vary from young to mature, with children aged 5-15 in attendance at any given meeting.

This is one of the few works that was established without any in-country contacts. Typically there is a contact or family member of someone in the Church who lives in the area and the Church follows up on the contact. In this case, the brothers were praying for direction, and a strong spirit prevailed to lead them to Ecuador. The Church of Jesus Christ was established there in 2006.

On the first trip there, the brothers introduced the driver who took them around to the Church. He eventually asked for his baptism, and he was the one who introduced the brothers to the first converts there. He also introduced the missionaries to the Tsáchila Indians, a native tribe located in Santo Domingo de los Colorados. This tribe is believed to be one of the oldest native tribes present in the Americas. During their initial visit, the missionaries had the opportunity to meet with one of the tribal leaders. As he was explaining the beliefs of his tribe, Apostle Isaac Smith spoke in the Gift of Tongues with the interpretation being "Now tell him the truth!" The brothers explained the beliefs of the Church and presented him with a Book of Mormon. He extended an invitation to the brothers to return and visit at any time.

The Committee solicits prayers for the growth of the Church there, specifically for in-country leadership and a facility to worship in.

The American Thanksgiving By Elder Duane Lovalvo

s autumn arrives in North America and fallen leaves lie withering on the cold ground, it is natural for our thoughts to turn toward our national holiday, Thanksgiving Day. Americans can trace the origins of this tradition all the way back to 1621 when grateful Pilgrims and local native tribes joined in a feast to celebrate God's providence in a successful harvest. After enduring years of hardships that included religious persecution, relocation, transoceanic travel, disease, and starvation these colonists had many reasons to celebrate a turning point in their ordeal. The Plymouth Colony would survive and eventually thrive, representing the precursor for our democratic American society.

Fast forwarding nearly 400 years to the year 2013 we Americans live in the most prosperous and powerful country in the world. In spite of a struggling economy, the United States remains a country that, relative to other industrialized nations, retains an enviable standard of living for its citizens. In this internet age of computers, smart phones and tablets, rarely do we think about the success or failure of the fall harvest, except for how it might affect our grocery bill. Most of us living today weren't alive during the Great Depression and can't even imagine what it's like to truly be hungry, not knowing where your next meal is going to come from.

The prophet Nephi saw the early American colonists and the growth of the United States of America in a vision he had more than 2,600 years ago. Here are a few excerpts:

And it came to pass that I beheld the Spirit of God, that it wrought upon other Gentiles; and they went forth out of captivity, upon the many waters (to the promised land) (I Nephi 13:13).

And it came to pass that I, Nephi, beheld that the Gentiles who had gone forth out of captivity did humble themselves before the Lord; and the power of the Lord was with them (I Nephi 13:16).

And I, Nephi, beheld that the Gentiles that had gone forth out of captivity were delivered by the power of God out of the hands of all other nations. And it came to pass that I, Nephi, beheld that they did prosper in the land; and I beheld a book (Bible), and it was carried forth among them (I Nephi, 13:19-20).

The Lord clearly had a plan for blessing these brave Europeans who were fleeing religious captivity for the wilds of a new world. Through their humble efforts the New England colonies were settled. Eventually a nation was born, uniquely founded on the principles of freedom. Value: Unity

Definition: Oneness; harmony; continuity without contention; brotherhood

Vital Verses:

"Now I beseech you, brethren, by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that ye all speak the same thing, and that there be no divisions among you; but that ye be perfectly joined together in the same mind and in the same judgment" (I Corinthians 1:10).

"And he commanded them that there should be no contention one with another, but that they should look forward with one eye, having one faith and one baptism, having their hearts knit together in unity and in love one towards another" (Mosiah 18:21).

Scriptural Example:

When we think of unity, we often think of everyone having the same job or acting in the same manner. But, in I Corinthians 12, Apostle Paul explains to the people of Corinth that unity doesn't have to be thought of as "sameness or being identical," but rather all working together for the same purpose. He explained to the people that they all made up the body of the Church (the body of Christ). It didn't matter if they were Jew or Gentile, prisoner or not—each person was a child of God and if they all joined together to spread His gospel, they would be unified. Read the entire chapter to learn how Paul compares the Church itself to a natural body and how each of us represents a different part. I call ear!

Life Application:

Have you ever heard the phrase, "We're on the same page"? It's a common catch phrase used among teammates, coworkers and even in relationships. The sentiment is simple: let's be united in our decision and work towards our goal together. Sure, Joe might think his plan is the right one. And Jane? Yep, her plan might in fact be even better. But, if Joe and Jane don't come to an agreement and move forward together, total chaos and a lot of headaches will ensue.

Let's face it: staying unified is tough. We all have our own opinions and our thoughts about how we should go about things—whether it's in our branches or missions, our families or our own life's path. But the important thing to remember is that in order to make any forward progress, we must stick together.

God didn't lay out a plan for us to be willy-nilly and haphazard about it. He gave us clear instructions to follow and reminded us not to deviate from the path. He knew, in His infinite wisdom, that if we all went along in our own way, we'd never make it to the finish line. Instead, He boiled it down to two small words: "Follow me." Staying unified—and keeping our hearts and minds focused on that key message—is of utmost importance to Him. He even warns us in Romans to stay away from those who cause divisions and go against His idea of unity: "For they that are such serve not our Lord Jesus Christ, but their own belly; and by good words and fair speeches deceive the hearts of the simple" (Romans 16:17-18).

Be unified with God and His teachings. Be unified with your brothers and sisters. Be unified in your families. Remember we're all on the same team, working together for good and His purpose.

Points to Ponder:

- Are you working towards unity in your life, or are you still hanging onto the idea that your idea is best?
- What is the hardest part of staying unified with God? With the Saints in your branch or mission? With your family?
- Do you find yourself compromising to keep the peace or compromising because you know it's for the greater good?

Brother Daniel was born and raised in the Church in Mexico, and brought his family to live in Michigan in the 1990s. Since many here had never seen Brother Daniel at work in the missionary field, comments were made as to how he becomes alive in the Spirit and Power of God, especially when he is among Spanish-speaking people. After other experiences were shared with the congregation, Brother Miguel, a close friend of Brother Daniel, shared the song "The Traveler" in Spanish.

The time had now arrived when our brother would be set apart for the work of an evangelist, having his feet washed as Jesus did to the disciples in Jerusalem. A wonderfully humble atmosphere entered the room as Brother Lou Vitto washed Brother Daniel's feet.

Brother Larry and Sister Rosanne Champine then sang "Go Out and Tell the World" as the Apostles and Evangelists encircled Brother Mora. As the song was sung the Spirit of God touched many in a powerful way and tears began to flow.

After kneeling in prayer for the Lord's direction as to who should perform the ordination, Brother Lyle Criscuolo held the oil above

ther Daniel's head, and Apostle Paul Liberto stepped forward.

Eving in San Diego, CA and laboring in the Church in Mexico for many years, Brother Paul has known Brother Daniel's family for a long time. He commented that he felt like a spiritual father to Brother Daniel as he began to ordain him in prayer. The Word of

the Lord then came forth saying, "Behold it is I that called! Behold it is I that ordained!"

Brother Daniel, along with his wife and son, shared their testimonies with the congregation. Brother Daniel expressed how humbled he was at the support shown by all of the brothers and sisters, the apostles, and evangelists. He reminded us that this day was not about him, but about the Church continuing to operate as it was established to do. He shared a few of the experiences that helped shape his life, including seeing brothers and sisters from the United States come to Mexico when he was a child to give gifts to the needy where he lived. Finding grace under Achish, David and all in his company were given the city of Ziklag to possess—which, interestingly, would remain from that point in time under Judah's control.


As subjects to King Achish, David and his men successfully battled the Geshurites, Gezrites, and Amalekites, who were all enemies to both the Philistines and Israelites.

everal years ago, a Christian family from a village named Puchettipedu, India heard the Restored Gospel for the first time. They heard about a Church that was named after the Son of God called The Church of Jesus Christ, and although that was important, what they heard next was even more remarkable.


They had never been taught that they needed to repent and be baptized by immersion, but when they heard it, they became convicted of its truth; not just one or two of them, but the entire family. So great was their joy in finding this new Church, that the family donated a piece of land near the village for the construction of a new meeting place.


For a year afterward, the land remained idle—we had no funds to help. In late 2011, the India Committee was able to provide some funds that allowed them to lay the foundation for the building. After almost another year passed, additional funds were provided to continue the project, knowing that although we gave all we had at the time, it was not sufficient to complete the building.

In June of this year, we were surprised to learn that the building was now complete, and received pictures showing what they had accomplished. We were overjoyed and well pleased to learn that the people of the village, along with some saints from another area of the Church in India, had raised the additional funds needed to complete their new Church home. This raising of funds, especially among poor villagers, was nothing less than a miracle and has rarely ever happened in India.

On August 14, 2013 over 150 people came to celebrate God's goodness and dedicate the new building. Although we have 15 members in Puchettipedu today, we expect many more to come now that we have a building.

This newly completed building is the twenty-first that The Church of Jesus Christ has constructed in India. We thank God for this, but we still need another 48 buildings to have a place for all of our congregations in India to meet. With the limited funds that are available to the committee, such a task seems impossible, but Jesus told his disciples, "...and nothing shall be impossible unto you" (Matthew 17:20).






